# **STARTING A NEW BUSINESS** 5 Steps to Get Your Business Registered





## **1. CHOOSE A LEGAL STRUCTURE & BUSINESS NAME**

Sole Proprietorship, General Partnership, Limited Liability Company (LLC), Corporation, etc.

#### 2. REGISTER YOUR BUSINESS WITH THE STATE .

If you are forming an LLC, partnership, non-profit, etc. you must file your business with the Secretary of State.

## 3. OBTAIN A FEDERAL TAX ID NUMBER \_\_

All businesses with employees (including those under the structure of a sole proprietorship) must obtain an Employer Identification Number (EIN) with the IRS. An EIN is free to obtain and may be filed electronically in most cases.

#### 4. OBTAIN NECESSARY LOCAL AND STATE LICENSES AND PERMITS

Different "licenses" and "permits" may be required for various businesses to officially (or legally) operate in Oklahoma.

## 5. ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS AND FILINGS FOR BUSINESSES WITH EMPLOYEES

If a business in Oklahoma has actual employees, it will have additional state requirements and filings, including:

- » Unemployment Tax Computation & Payment Oklahoma Employment Security Commission (OESC) **oesc.ok.gov**
- » Workers Compensation Insurance Oklahoma Workers Compensation Commission (WCC), 405-522-3222, wcc.ok.gov
