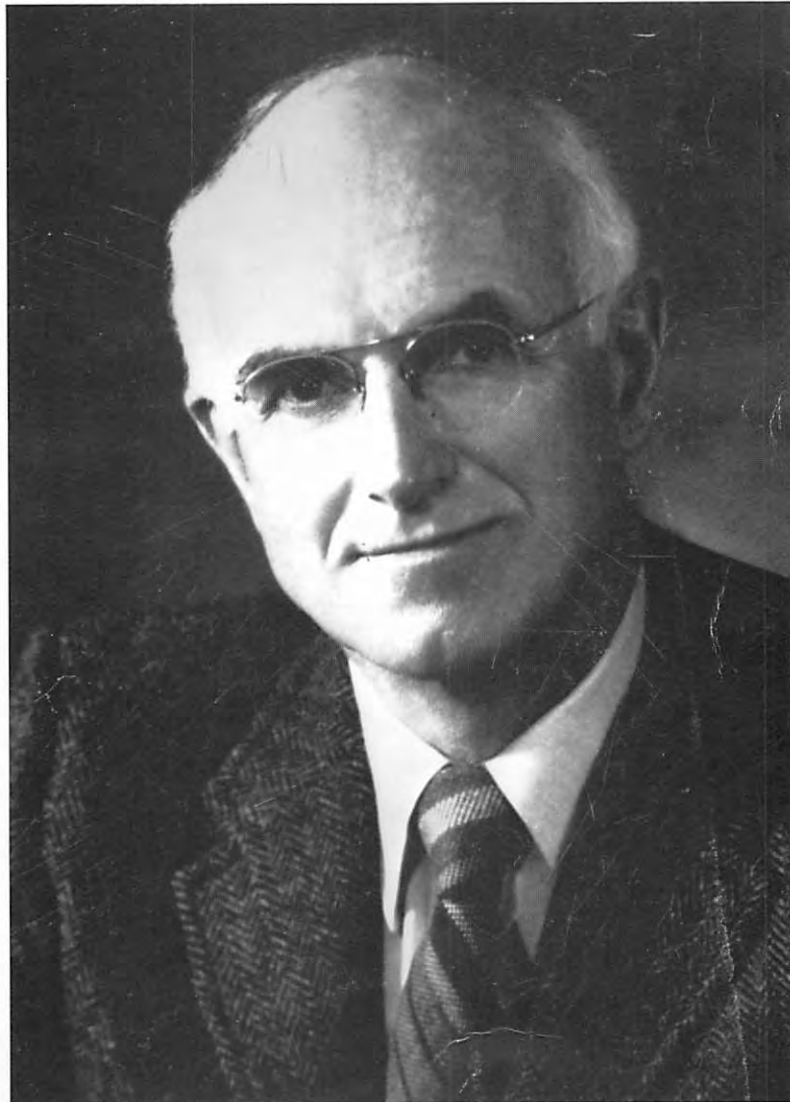

DEDICATION

**“Your accomplishments have expanded the frontiers of medicine.

The sentiments expressed by Board of Selectmen Chairman John A. Beccia Jr. were echoed by many friends and admirers, who braved a record downpour on a Sunday afternoon in April to pay tribute to Dr. Joseph E. Murray, Milford native and 1990 Nobel Laureate.

Dr. Murray, the son of Judge William A. Murray and Mary DePasquale Murray, was born in Milford in 1919, attended Milford schools and graduated from Milford High School in the Class of 1936. His scholastic achievements were matched by his athletic accomplishments, particularly as an outstanding infielder on the Milford High School and Milford Junior League baseball teams.

Dr. Murray graduated from Holy Cross College in 1940, and received his M.D. degree from Harvard Medical School in 1943. His experiences as an army surgeon during World War II and a fascination with the phenomenon of tissue rejection led Dr. Murray to specialize in plastic and reconstructual surgery. In 1954, when he transplanted a kidney from one twin to another, Dr. Murray made medical history by performing the first successful human organ transplant.

Long recognized as an authority and pioneer in the fields of organ transplants and plastic surgery, Dr. Murray was honored with the Nobel Prize in Medicine on December 10, 1990.

The public reception held April 21, 1991, had been planned by Milford Justice Francis Larkin and his Committee. Milfordians, both past and present, enjoyed a rare opportunity to talk with Dr. Murray and his family. It was truly a memorable day in which “Milford honored Dr. Murray, and Dr. Murray honored Milford.”

BOARD OF SELECTMEN/ EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

The Offices of the Milford Board of Selectmen and the Executive Secretary are located at Milford Town Hall. Residents may contact the office by dialing 634-2303. Office hours are 8:30 am - 5:00 pm Monday through Friday.

The Board of Selectmen meets Monday evenings at 7:00 pm in Room 03 of Milford Town Hall; these meetings are televised over the local cable network. A formal record of these meetings (*The Minutes*) is available for viewing. The Executive Secretary manages the day to day operations of the Selectmen's Office and is the administrative supervisor of the department heads appointed by the Selectmen.

The Board is the local licensing commission for alcoholic beverages sales and consumption, restaurants, boarding houses, entertainment and amusements, motor vehicle sales and services, parades, movie theaters, taxis/limousines, tag days, yard sales and other licenses. During fiscal 1990 license/permit fees generated \$103,910 in revenue for the Town. Parking fines are also paid at the Selectmen's Office and generate sufficient revenue to make the program self supporting.

In the area of personnel recruitment, Mr. Frank McVeigh was appointed as Asst. Zoning Enforcement Officer, filling the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Alan Green.

The Selectmen's Office continues to coordinate cost-effective inter-departmental purchasing activities, including fuel oil, office supplies and equipment. A data processing system linking the financial offices of Town Hall has been installed and is in process of implementation. The payroll program for

all Town employees has been brought in house, under the joint management of the Town Treasurer and Town Accountant. Effective May, 1990, the provisions of the State Uniform Procurement Act now govern purchases of goods and services by all school/municipal departments.

Town Meeting appropriations and federal/state grants continue to fund capital projects such as the Small Cities Program for downtown revitalization, recreational improvements at Louisa Lake, and a critically needed upgrade of the electrical system at the Milford Police Station.

The Soldiers' Memorial currently under construction at Draper Park is moving along according to schedule. In addition to Town Meeting appropriations, funding sources include a steady influx of contributions from local organizations, and families and friends of veterans.

In August of 1990, the Selectmen embarked upon a self-insurance program for the Town's general liability, property and motor vehicles. The program is administered jointly by Town Counsel and the Executive Secretary. It is estimated that the Town will save over \$300,000 in insurance premiums each year.

In May of 1990, the Selectmen undertook a comprehensive relocation and upgrading of the Town's streetlights. All obsolete incandescent lights were removed, and more efficient sodium light fixtures were installed. Lights were relocated to provide optimal illumination for public safety purposes. This program will save an estimated \$40,000 in lighting costs per year.

The local hotel/motel excise tax adopted by Town Meeting in 1988 is now at the statutory limit of 4%. This tax is now generating an annual revenue stream of over \$170,000.

Much of the Selectmen's energies in 1990 were directed toward providing the public with a series of informational public hearings and

expert evaluations and reports, so that Town Meeting could make an informed decision on whether to permit the construction of gas fueled power generation plants in Milford. The Town Meeting membership voted in June of 1990 to permit such plants, but to regulate their construction and operations by the requirement of a Special Permit.

Chapter 40, Section 49 of the Massachusetts General Laws mandates the publication of this Annual Report, which must include reports of the School Committee, Town Accountant and Town Treasurer. Beyond that which is mandated, however, the Selectmen hope to provide information of interest and practical value. Your comments and suggestions for improvements to both format and content are welcomed.

The Board of Selectmen encourages Milford's residents to take an active role in the development of our community. If you will share your experience and expertise by becoming involved in town committees and volunteer efforts, your Town will continue to grow and prosper.

BOARD OF ASSESSORS

Milford set its tax rate for FY91 in September of 1990. Once again the Selectmen, with the recommendation of the Assessors, voted to remain with a dual rate. The tax rate for residential property is \$9.43 per thousand and the commercial, industrial and personal property rate is \$16.67 per thousand.

Beginning in January 1991, once again the Town will be undergoing a revaluation update to bring all property up to full and fair cash value as mandated by state law. This update will be reflected in the FY92 tax bills which will be mailed sometime in the fall of 1991.

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CAPITAL PLANNING COMMITTEE

The Capital Planning Committee meets on a scheduled basis to review, prioritize and recommend to Town Meeting on capital expenditures in excess of \$10,000.

The Capital Planning Committee is currently working on the development of a Capital Improvement Plan to insure that funds reserved in the future for capital expenditures

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Milford Conservation Commission consists of seven members appointed by the Board of Selectmen to serve a three year term. The Commission is responsible for the administration of the Wetlands Protection Act. The Act is designed to protect certain wildlife habitats, to prevent damage to our waterways, degradation of our water supply, pollution of ground water and to assure that drainage from proposed development won't adversely affect abutting properties or contribute to flooding.

During 1990, the office of the Assessors has experienced a change of personnel with the retirement of Rita Abbondanza, Assistant Assessor, a dedicated employee with over 20 years of service, and the welcoming of Paula Keefe, Assessor/Administrator. During this transition a very special thanks is extended to Barbara McDonnell and Pat Heath for their continued support and professional manner in which they conduct the business of daily operation in the Assessors office.

BLACKSTONE VALLEY VOCATIONAL REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

The Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional School District has provided vocational-technical education for citizens of its thirteen member towns since 1966. The vocational-technical curriculum offers courses in air-conditioning, auto body, auto technology, computer information processing, culinary arts, drafting, electrical, electronics, graphic arts, health services, machine technology, metal fabrication, painting and decorating, and plumbing. The traditional academic curriculum offers instruction in English, mathematics, science, social studies, business, computer literacy and physical education. Special education services are also available for students with special needs.

The school facility is located on Pleasant Street in Upton. A total of 745 students are currently enrolled in grades 9 through 12, of which 107 are Milford residents.

The School Committee meets at the school facility on the third Thursday of each month, beginning at 7:30 pm, in the Committee conference room. John V. Fernandes, Esq., is the Committee representative from Milford. The Superintendent-Director is Eugene D. Picard.

The Wetlands Protection Act, various state regulations and Town of Milford by-laws clearly define the scope and authority of the Conservation Commission. The aim of the Commission is to protect our community from the results of possible ecological abuse due to the violation of these laws.

The Conservation Commission issued 23 Orders of Conditions, collected \$4,662.50 from notice of Intent filings as regulated by the Wetlands Protection Act fee system, stocked Louisa Lake with trout, contributed to the Louisa Lake improvement project and was generally involved in various community activities relating to our environment during this past year.

The Conservation Commission is always interested in meeting others who are concerned with environmental matters and are willing to volunteer their time and abilities to the Town of Milford as do the current Commission members. There are openings for Associate Members that can lead to full Commission participation as vacancies occur. Please contact any member for additional information.

The Conservation Commission meets the first and third Tuesday of each month in the Milford Town Hall. Inquiries may be directed to the Chairman, other Commission members, Conservation Clerk Carol Ann Thompson, or Michael Santora, Town Engineer.

THE COUNCIL ON AGING

The Milford Council on Aging consists of a fifteen-member Board of Directors appointed by the Board of Selectmen. The purpose of the Council on Aging is to provide services and programs which promote the welfare of the estimated 4,300 elderly residents of Milford. All residents of Milford, age 60 and over and disabled resi-

dents regardless of age, are eligible for these services and programs.

The Council on Aging conducts a monthly meeting at 10:00 am on the second Tuesday of each month at the Senior Center. These meetings are open to the public and residents are invited to have their concerns and suggestions placed on the agenda for these meetings.

The Council on Aging is the governing body of the Milford Senior Center which is located at 15 Winter Street. The Business Office of the Senior Center handles an average of 900 incoming and outgoing calls per month. At least half of these are from residents requesting services and information. The Senior Center is open from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm Monday through Saturday; on Tuesday evenings from 5:00 to 9:00 pm and on Sunday afternoons from 1:00 pm to 5:00 pm

The Senior Center is staffed by five town-funded positions including a full-time Senior Center Director. An additional three positions are funded by the Green Thumb Program and one position is funded by the Department of Elder Affairs through the Elder Service Corps Volunteer Program.

The newly established Outreach Office of the Senior Center provide assistance to an average of 40 senior citizens and their families per month. Our Outreach Coordinators are available to assist senior citizens with whatever difficulty they may be experiencing. This office also provides information and referral services for legal aid, home repair, Alzheimers' services, health services, SSI, Social Security Home Care, consumer information, Medicare, Medicaid, personal emergency response systems, elder employment, day care, etc. Residents, age 60 and over, may receive their Senior Citizens Identification Card from this office. Elders, age 65 and over, may receive assistance with application for Elder Homestead Protection and ComGas discounts.

Telephone reassurance calls and home visits for elders who are alone during the day can also be arranged at the request of the elder or their families.

The Visiting Nurse Association offers a health screening clinic every other month at the center and also an annual Flu Immunization Clinic. In addition, the Council on Aging sponsors a monthly Podiatry Clinic and an annual Vision Screening.

The Council on Aging assists residents of all ages by providing an intake site for the S.M.O.C. Fuel Assistance Program and by conducting the Quarterly Food Distribution.

The Senior Center offers many recreational programs to enrich the lives of the older residents of the community. Recreational activities include holiday and theme parties, line dancing, craft and knitting clubs; Whist and Cribbage Leagues, day trips and Sunday socials. Guest Speakers are engaged to provide information on a wide range of issues pertinent to the elderly and their families.

The Council on Aging van is available to seniors and/or disabled who have no other means of transportation. The van is in operation Monday through Friday from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm. Reservations for the use of the van must be made a minimum of 24 hours in advance; however, medical appointments can be made up to three months advance. A 25¢ per way donation is requested. In 1990 the Council on Aging van made 7,714 trips, traveling 16,937 miles.

The Council on Aging sponsors a weekly shopping bus alternating trips among the four Milford supermarkets. Senior Citizens are picked up at their door and assistance with packages is provided. A \$2 donation is requested for this service.

The Council on Aging serves as a host agency for the Tri-Valley Nutrition Program. This program operates 5 days a week (Monday

through Friday) from the Senior Center. Seniors may come to the center to receive a hot, nutritious meal or eligible seniors may have their meal home-delivered. In 1990 this program served 29,391 meals, 21,305 of these meals were home delivered. A total of 72 volunteers assisted with the Nutrition Program throughout the year, most of whom are elderly themselves.

The Elder Milfordian News is a free monthly publication of the Council on Aging. This newsletter provides important information on elderly related issues and activities and programs at the Senior Center.

During 1991 the Council on Aging, in cooperation with the Milford School Department, has made great advances in intergeneration programming. Elderly volunteers have been working with the classroom reading programs and volunteers of the C.A.R.E. Program of the high school have been raking leaves and shovelling snow for elderly residents. Students of the Business Education Department of the high school have compiled a computerized mailing list of all elderly residents so that the monthly newsletter can be mailed directly into the homes of elderly residents sometime in 1991. The highlights of the year was the Junior/Senior Get Acquainted Breakfast which was held in October at the high school.

DOG CONTROL DEPARTMENT

The Dog Control Department is staffed on a 24-hour basis by a Dog Control Officer and two assistants. Coverage is provided by routine patrol on Monday through Friday from 8 am to 6 pm. Coverage is limited to an "on call basis" only from 6 pm to 8 am weekdays and Saturdays and Sundays. The licensing period begins April 1st at the Town Clerk's office. A rabies vac-

ination certificate must be provided. Residents may call 478-3871 for assistance or additional information.

OFFICE OF FAIR HOUSING

The Town of Milford, through its Board of Selectmen, has approved and continues to support a Fair Housing Action Plan in compliance with guidelines promulgated by the Massachusetts Commission Against Discrimination and in conformance with all State and Federal laws relevant to the provision of equal choice and housing for all individuals.

The Plan is a public document and available for inspection in the Selectmen's Office. The Plan has been implemented through the efforts of the Fair Housing Committee with representation from the Planning Board, the Housing Authority and the community-at-large. This committee is charged with and continues to develop a bilingual outreach program to disseminate information, to review the actions of community boards and agencies pertaining to housing, the pursuit of sources of funding for the sup-

port of fair housing activities, and the resolution of complaints concerning alleged discrimination in housing through its multi-lingual Complaint Intake Program.

The Fair Housing Committee continues to work with Town and State officials to make it possible to produce new housing that will be consistent with the character of the community and affordable. The Town of Milford received official approval as an Equitable Housing Community on May 1, 1987.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Milford Fire Department consists of the Fire Chief, Deputy Chief, 5 Lieutenants, 31 Permanent Firefighters, 4 Call Captains, 32 Call Firefighters, and 1 Clerk.

During the calendar year of 1990 the Milford Fire Department responded to 2,653 calls and issued 1,315 permits. They are as follows:

The unfavorable fiscal situation that prevails locally and state-wide at this time will have long term negative effects on the Fire Department especially in the areas of response effectiveness and equipment reliability and capability.

A comparison of the calls responded to during the years of 1989 and 1990 reveal that the workload of the Milford Fire Department has increased by 19% while the Departmental staff has decreased by approximately 10% from 1989.

Two major pieces of fire apparatus that must be on a capital replacement plan are, Ladder #1, a 1968 model which due to certain factors and deficiencies had to be downgraded from 100 feet to 85 feet. (This not only affects our ability to reach high buildings but cuts down on horizontal reach which is very important in residential firefighting to reach a second floor from the street or driveway).

The second vehicle is our Rescue #1 consisting of a steel modular body constructed in 1978 and extremely prone to body rot, mounted on a 1986 Ford light duty truck chassis which is overloaded beyond its rated capacity which in turn results in increased repairs and extensive downtime.

Hopefully the financial picture will brighten in the near future and allow us to address these and many other concerns of the Town of Milford in general.

COMMISSION FOR THE HANDICAPPED

In September, 1985, the Commission was reorganized and has been meeting on a monthly basis. Some of the powers and duties include, but are not limited to, reviewing recommendations and policies of all departments and agencies of the town: to participate in an advisory capacity concerning discrimination against the handicapped and to insure the equal status of the handicapped in education, employment, economic, political, health, legal and social spheres.

BOARD OF HEALTH

Board of Health meetings are held bi-weekly on Monday evenings at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall. Paul Mazzuchelli is the Health Officer for the town and acts as Agent for the Board. The Board of Health is responsible for issuing permits and licenses for food service establishments, gas installations, septic systems, and also inspects the above establishments and work.

All housing complaints are answered and violations corrected to the satisfaction of the Board.

Health Clinics are held on a regular basis by the Visiting Nurse Association. These include well baby, blood pressure clinics and flu clinics.

The Board is responsible for the residential rubbish pick-up and has instituted a recycling program which will become mandatory as of July 1, 1991. Residents are bringing their recyclables to the Transfer Facility on Cedar Street and the Board is most gratified by the residents response to recycling. The Transfer Facility hours are at

present, 12:00 noon to 4:00 pm on Wednesdays and Thursdays, and it is open from 8:00 am until 4:00 pm on Fridays and Saturdays.

The Board awarded the contract for an environmental study of the former landfill to Weston & Sampson Engineers, Inc. of Peabody, MA. The study will be done in 1991, in preparation for the capping of the landfill.

The board also conducted a Mosquito Control Project in July and August and the town was sprayed at least three times.

The Board of Health conducts a Dental Clinic program in the school system, which provides a Dental Hygienist who screens the children and provides a Fluoride Rinse Program with the assistance of volunteer mothers. The Board is grateful to these volunteers for their help.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The department's general maintenance work continued as usual. Crews patched and cleaned basins, hottopped various locations, swept streets and sidewalks, repaired equipment, cut brush along the roadside, cleaned debris from roadsides and brooks, repaired walls at various locations in the brooks, replaced street and square signs, replaced traffic signs at several locations, painted crosswalks and traffic lines and assisted all other Town Departments when necessary.

The Highway Department operated with 15 employees:

Throughout the previous twelve months the employees of the Highway Department participated in the reconstruction/resurfacing of Central Street which was funded through the Massachusetts Small Cities Program.

Highway Dept. employees also started the foundation for the War Memorial Project in Draper Park.

Two 10,000 gallon gas/diesel fuel tanks were installed at the rear of the Highway Department Garage

located on Front St. During the months of August and September.

Miscellaneous Improvements

Repaired catchbasins at various locations.

Snow Removal

The winter was relatively mild. Roads were plowed a total of four times and sanded and salted a total of seventeen times.

HISTORICAL COMMISSION

The Commission reports with sadness the passing of our secretary Marguerite F. Hayes. She had been a member of the Commission for 15 years.

Prospect Heights was placed on the National Register of Historic Places as the Prospect Heights Historic District. The homes were built at the turn of the century by Draper Corporation.

Historical Museum at Memorial Hall opened its doors to the public on a regular basis. Each Wednesday a member of the Commission is available from 2:00 to 4:00 to greet visitors. The museum is also open to the public at each function sponsored by the Cultural Commission.

Renovations to the Brick Schoolhouse included a new front door, threshold, and door casing. Open house was held Saturday afternoon on September 29. People enjoyed the lawn party and reminiscing of the days gone by.

The pyramid of Civil War cannon balls were restored and returned to the original site in front of Memorial Hall. Commissioner Robert Samiagio painted the cannon balls and cannons on display.

The November 1990 Open House was held at the Museum featuring a Civil War theme with the Uxbridge Minutemen as guest speakers. A Civil War presentation included Fife and Drum music, arms display, and

various demonstrations complementing the period. The Commission also displayed many G.A.R. artifacts and portraits in its collection.

Commissioner Rosamond Cooper presented a souvenir plate, cup, and booklet commemorating the 250th anniversary of The First Congregational Church. The Commission continues to receive many donations and memorabilia for display.

The Commission meets the first Wednesday of each month in the Memorial Hall Cultural Center at 7 pm. All meetings are open to the public.

INSPECTOR OF ANIMALS

During 1900, all bovine animals and flocks of poultry were inspected and found to be in good health. All dogs involved in biting incidents were quarantined for the prescribed period and checked for proper immunization. No problems were found.

information and research questions answered by our reference staff, or for the many adults who are developing their basic reading, writing or conversational English skills through the library-based literacy program?

The Milford Town Library was busier than ever before during 1990. The number of library users was up 12%—164,587 people visited the library. The circulation of books and materials increased by 10% to 190,608, and these circulation increases are represented in all age groups, all educational backgrounds, and from all types of borrowers. Everyone is using the Milford Town Library more. As the chart above indicates, the Town of Milford gets a tremendous return on each dollar appropriated for the library.

Budget constraints in FY'91 have forced the library to cut nine hours from the sixty-five weekly hours the library was open to the public. Preliminary figures for the first six months of FY'91 clearly indicate the library has never been busier—that more activity has been crammed into fewer hours of operation.

Public support for the library is not only evidenced in the overwhelming demand on library services, but in the support of our very active Friends of the Milford Town Library organization, who have provided funds for the museum passes, subsidized with the help of several Arts Lottery grants the library's public performance programs, and organized a very successful ongoing book discussion group. Other local organizations recognized the value of the Milford Town Library by contributing toward books or other services. These groups include the Ridgewood Womens Club, the Milford Artists Guild, the Greenleaf Garden Club, Mother Goose Nursery School, class of 1937 of Milford High School, plus several book donations in memory of loved ones.

The Trustees (who regularly meet on the second Wednesday of each month, except in July and August), staff and Friends of the Milford Town Library would again like to take this opportunity to thank the people of Milford for their continued support of the Library.

OFF-STREET PARKING COMMISSION

The Off-Street Parking Commission is charged with the responsibility of fostering the provision of off-street parking facilities, and maintaining those facilities.

Meetings of the Commission are held in Town Hall and are posted with the Town Clerk. Questions concerning the parking lots or the use thereof should be addressed to the Chairman, in care of Town Hall.

OFFICE OF PLANNING AND ENGINEERING

The Office of Planning and Engineering consists of the Town Engineer and the Town Planner, who serve as consultants to all Town departments with primary responsibility to the Board of Selectmen, the Planning Board and the Conservation Commission.

The primary function of the department is to review new residential, commercial and industrial development plans and make recommendations regarding these plans to the various Boards and Commissions.

The department is also responsible for obtaining grants from State and Federal agencies and developer impact mitigation commitments to upgrade the infrastructure and minimize impacts of the various developments.

The major projects that this department has been involved with over the past year include:

- Administration of over \$833,000 in State and Federal grants
- Securing contributions for and overseeing development of planometric map of the downtown area
- Signalization of Fortune Boulevard/Dilla Street/Cedar Street intersection

- Middle School West school zone signalization
- Depot Street ballfield
- East Main Street pedestrian crossing
- Louisa Lake recreation area improvements
- Marketing of Town-owned industrial land
- Marketing of downtown property
- Draper Park war memorial
- Development of regional development plan for greater Boston area, known as MetroPlan 2000
- Enron power plant proposal
- Development of Water Resource Protection District by-law
- Milford Pond improvements
- Development of cohesive signage program for Bear Hill Industrial Area
- Route 109 widening
- Updating zoning regulations regarding structures and sight obstructions

PARKS/ RECREATION DEPARTMENT

Department responsibilities include maintenance of six school grounds, 20 parks and fields, maintenance of Off-St. parking lots, operation of Town Pool, and the Tree Department.

Facilities maintained by park department were enjoyed by many organizations including High School athletics and gym classes, youth soccer, various softball and baseball leagues, Pony League football and summer basketball leagues.

The town pool continues as a popular spot for residents. Budget cuts reduced pool season from 70 to 60 days. A user-fee program continues with funds directed towards a revolving account.

The department honored three requests for carnivals, including a July 4th celebration with fireworks and helicopter rides at Fino Field. The department thanks the Milford Firefighters for making the day a huge success.

Votolato Field, a new baseball facility, was completed thanks to a \$60,000 gift from WGB Construction Company.

The department took advantage of a prisoners work release program with Concord Farms. Ten inmates performed general maintenance duties for two months at no cost to the town.

The Tree Department removed a number of damaged or dead trees and provided wood-chipping services at over 300 locations. A user-fee program has been instituted for 1991.

Department goals include maintenance of existing school grounds, parks, fields, upgrading facilities and development of new facilities. Plans for building a bandstand are being explored.

Meetings are held weekly on Tuesday evenings.

PERSONNEL BOARD

The Personnel Board is responsible for setting Wage and Salary levels of any new employee and the classification of any person seeking employment in the Town of Milford.

The Board also reviews salaries, salary structures and job descrip-

tions required by law. The Personnel Board meets approximately twice a month and more often when preparing Article 2 for Town Meeting.

Salary structures are prepared by the Personnel Board under Article 2 of the annual Town Warrant, subject to Town Meeting approval.

The Board meets with any town employee that falls under its jurisdiction, with the approval of the Department Head. The Personnel Board also mails information to numerous towns requesting salary and job descriptions for comparison, and will meet with their Board members if a meeting is requested.

The Personnel Board is constantly upgrading and clarifying questions pertaining to the Town's Personnel by-laws.

Presently the Board is operating under the guidelines of the Olney study which Town meeting adopted. The Board is consistently evaluating positions and changes in job descriptions required by law.

PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board meets regularly on the first and third Tuesday of each month. The meetings are held in the Town Hall on Main St. Special meetings are also held as required. This is determined by the amount of work required to be processed. All meetings start at 7:00 pm. All meetings are posted, as required by law, at the office of the Town Clerk. Dates and times of our meetings may be confirmed by consulting the meeting notices.

The Planning Board's statutory authority embraces the following procedures:

Processing of the subdivision of land.

Site Plan Review hearings leading to construction of buildings and for use of land.

Granting of Special Permits for Housing for the Elderly and for Planned Residential Communities (condominiums).

Reviewing petitions for variances and special permits submitted to the Zoning Board of Appeal for recommendations to the Z.B.A.

Conducting public hearings for Chapter 121A Tax Agreements with subsequent recommendations to the Board of Selectmen.

Reviewing and approving acceptance of streets into the Town's public ways, with recommendation to the Town Meeting.

Reviewing amended road layouts of public ways for recommendation to the Town Meeting.

Holding public hearings for zoning amendments submitted to the town and preparing reports on the matters for the Town Meeting.

Residential, commercial and industrial development slowed during FY90. This is in direct relationship to the direction that the economy has taken during the same time frame. The inventory of subdivision lots already approved and of public street frontage lots available for construction for residential uses was compiled as of December, 1990. On that date 538 lots were eligible to obtain building permits.

The number of dwelling units (single homes, two family homes and P.R.C. homes) eligible to be built on approval lots totals approximately 570 units as of 12/90.

During FY 1990, the Planning Board processed 30 Variances and Special Permits; held 13 public hearings for Site Plan Review; processed 28 Waivers from Site Plan Review; conducted 8 public hearings for amendments to the zoning bylaw; processed 1 Preliminary subdivision submission; processed and held public hearings for 3 Definitive subdivision plans; reviewed and signed 25 81-P plans; and held 1 hearing for a P.R.C.

As we continue to try and meet the needs of our community our Extended Day Program, which was developed to aid working parents, continues to prosper and improve. The program runs from 3-6 PM in accordance with the school calendar at Woodland Elementary School, and is staffed by professional teachers and both adult and student aides.

SCHOOL COMMITTEE

Money was tight in the spring of 1990 and it was necessary for the School Department to eliminate four supervisors' positions, three writing specialists' positions and the full-time position of Director of Occupational Education.

Mr. Thomas J. Cullen assumed the superintendency of the Milford Public School on July 1, 1990.

The maintenance staff, under the direction of Mr. William Fertitta, renovated the four portable classrooms across from the Memorial School and they were available for

use in September. This brought the number of portable classrooms in use to eight.

Based on the serious space needs in the system, an Ad Hoc Committee to Study the Mt. Vernon Report was appointed. The Committee worked diligently through the remainder of the year and will report their findings to the School Committee in April 1991.

A get-acquainted Breakfast was held for our senior citizens. In the weeks following the breakfast, many intergenerational programs were developed in the various schools. Several task forces were established and these task forces will report to the School Committee in the spring of 1991. Areas to be studied include community service learning, an enriched high school computer program, homogenous/heterogenous grouping early childhood, homework policies, literacy activities and school business partnerships.

- National Honor Society for selected Juniors and Seniors

Special Features of Milford Middle School included:

- Reading is a major subject which meets every day.
- Students are prepared for advanced placement in the high school in the areas of Math and Foreign Language.
- The school(s) are broken down into five little schools, known as clusters.
- Students participate in a maximum of three (3) field trips per school year.
- Energetic, enthusiastic and dedicated staff.
- Several programs which motivate students to achieve academically, (i.e. Principal's List, Student of the Week, Letters of Recognition, Cluster Awards Programs)

Chapter I programs were conducted in reading at the elementary level and in math at the secondary level.

Bilingual programs were conducted at the elementary level with the emphasis shifting to English as a Second Language (ESL) in grades 6-12.

A full range of Special Education services was offered for special needs students 2½ to 22 years of age.

SYSTEM PROFILE

BOARD OF SEWER COMMISSIONERS

The Board of Sewer Commissioners is pleased to report on the completion of the first full year under the Sewer Enterprise Fund. Careful management of expenditures and receipts and judicious use of private contributions has permitted the Board to make significant improvements in the Town's sewerage system.

The existing sewage pumping stations at Route 495 and Birch Street have been completely renovated and now have increased capacity. Both stations are now functioning, servicing large commercial and industrial properties and the Southeast portion of Milford.

Construction plans for the new Charles River Interceptor and a new pumping station are nearing completion. This interceptor is the first phase of a two-step process de-

signed to provide relief for over-taxed older sewers in the center of the Town. Construction could begin late in 1991 when all permits have been acquired.

The Board of Sewer Commissioners will continue to address the deficiencies in an aging collection system and to plan for future growth in our community.

Our special thanks go to the Sewer Department's administrative and operational staff employees who perform their duties often unnoticed but always appreciated.

COLLECTOR OF TAXES

The Collector of Taxes would like to report that although the economic conditions of the times are not very conducive to good tax collections, my office is still being very aggressive in the collection process of delinquent accounts.

I would like to thank my staff once again for all of their efforts throughout the year, and also thank all other town departments for their continued co-operation.

VERNON GROVE CEMETERY DEPARTMENT

The Trustees of Venon Grove Cemetery submit the following report for this year ending June 30, 1990, Sale of Lots total 22 graves for this year and Interments total 44.

A reorganization meeting was held April 18, 1990, there was an agreement to keep the same slate as last year.

DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS' SERVICES

The Milford office of Veterans' Services provides both financial/medical assistance to veterans and their dependents based on the following criteria:

1. War time service with a separation or discharge under honorable conditions
2. Legal residence in the Town of Milford
3. Financial need

Applications for benefits are initiated in the Milford office and sent to the Boston office of Veterans' Services for approval. Once approved, each case is monitored on a regular basis to assure that all regulations are being complied with. In many instances, applicants are only in the program for a short period of time while they are seeking employment or applying for alternative sources of benefits.

Because the Veterans department is a branch of Human Services for the State of Massachusetts, we work very closely with other departments under its jurisdiction such as the Massachusetts Rehabilitation Commission, the Rate Setting Commission and the Department of Public Welfare just to name a few.

The Veterans' office also works very closely with the local office of the Department of Employment and Training. In addition to providing a representative for veterans, they also provide us with weekly postings of jobs in the surrounding towns. The office also provides work-shops to assist veterans with job-seeking skills. It is the combined effort of both offices that assists veterans in reentering employment as soon as possible.

In addition to the assistance provided above, the staff works very

closely with the various Veterans' Administration (federal) departments throughout the state advising local veterans and their dependents of their entitlements for such benefits such as:

- filing for pensions and compensations
- burial allowances
- Veterans' Administration insurance
- education benefits
- advising and filing claims with Social Security
- VA hospital care
- annual updates of various benefits and
- other related miscellaneous benefits

METROPOLITAN AREA PLANNING COUNCIL

Thanks to Milford and 100 other communities, the Metropolitan Area Planning Council was able to continue to provide communities with regional planning services throughout fiscal year 1990.

As part of MetroPlan 2000—our regional development plan—Milford was included in the following projects: mapping the sewer service areas, detailed analyses of sewer and water capacities, solid waste management analyses and mapping, analysis of local transportation priorities, economic development and housing analyses, and open space and resource protection data analyses.

Milford was also included in these MAPC demographic reports: (1) Employment and Income Forecasts (2) Population and Age Group Forecasts (3) Regional and Community Population and Employment Forecasts and (4) Business and Residential Growth in Metropolitan Boston.

MAPC also tracks recent and proposed commercial, industrial and residential development projects in Milford for research purposes.

The SouthWest Advisory Planning (SWAP) Committee designed a housing work program to seek more funding or financing for affordable rental and/or ownership housing through the formation of a bank credit pool or a revolving loan fund.

As a member of the SWAP Committee, Milford's representative participated in: interviews about transportation priorities; the compila-

tion of a list of new commuter parking lots, including a map of potential sites; mapping sewer, transit, and zoning areas for the 10-town SWAP region; and a housing forum for local bankers, realtors and local officials to discuss affordable housing opportunities.

REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

Since June, 1988, the Redevelopment Authority has focused its attention on the effort to revitalize the downtown area. Towards this end, a downtown advisory committee was formed, comprised of representatives from the downtown retail, professional and banking communities.

The Redevelopment Authority and/or its sub-committee participated in the following projects:

- completion of a planometric map of the downtown area
- development of a marketing package for the downtown area
- oversight and administration of the Massachusetts Small Cities program; total grant funds received to date being \$781,538

QUESTION 2 – Law Proposed by Initiative Petition

Do you approve of a law summarized below, on which no vote was taken by the Senate or House of Representatives before May 2, 1990?

SUMMARY

The proposed law would place restrictions on the State's use of consultants. It would place various limits on the amount of profit, overhead charges and expenses that the State could pay consultants. It would limit the duration of consultant contracts to two years and any extension to one year, and it would limit the degree to which such contracts could be changed to require payments in excess of the original contract. The proposed law would limit to \$100,000 the amount the State could pay on a consultant contract with an individual and would require all other consultant contracts in excess of \$25,000 to be sought through competitive bidding. It would prohibit consultants from supervising State employees, and it would limit the use of consultants as substitutes for State employee positions.

In addition, the proposed law would place limits on the total amount of money State agencies, departments and Authorities could spend on consultants each year. Subsidiary provisions would also establish a method for these entities to gradually come into compliance with the new spending limits and would give authority to the State Secretary of Administration and Finance, on request, to permit some spending in excess of the new limits. The proposed law would also require State agencies, departments and Authorities as well as the Secretary of Administration and Finance to submit yearly reports concerning the State's consultant contracts to certain legislative committees to the Inspector General.

Finally, the proposed law provides that any of its provisions, if found by a court to be unconstitutional or otherwise unlawful, would be severed from the law and the remaining provisions would continue in effect.

QUESTION 3 – Law Proposed by Initiative Petition

Do you approve of a law summarized below, on which no vote was taken by the Senate or the House of Representatives before May 2, 1990?

SUMMARY

This proposed law would change the state income tax rate, affect language contained in certain tax provisions, and regulate the setting of fees by state agencies and authorities.

The proposed law would set the state income tax rate on Part B taxable income (in general, earned income) at 4.25% for 1991 and 4.625% for 1992, except for income from unemployment compensation, alimony, Massachusetts bank interest, rental income, pension and annuity income, and IRA/Keogh deductions, which would be taxed at 5%.

The proposed law also provides that the fee imposed by any state agency or authority shall be no more than the fee that was in effect on or before June 30, 1988. The state Secretary of Administration would determine the amount to be charged for any service, registration, regulation, license, fee, permit or other public function, except for the rates of tuition or fees at state colleges and universities or any fees or charges relative to the administration and operation of the state courts. Any increase or decrease in a fee, or the establishment of any new fee, would require the approval of the Legislature. Any increase in a fee would not apply to persons 65 years of age or older. No state agency or authority could collect any fee which exceeds the administrative costs directly incurred by the state agency or authority to produce and process the application for any license or permit. The Secretary of Administration must report information concerning fees to the Legislature on an annual basis.

The proposed law provides that for tax periods commencing on or after January 1, 1991, language in certain provisions of the Massachusetts general laws relating to taxes shall be the same as it was on August 2, 1989, or the effective date of the proposed law, whichever language yields less tax revenue. The tax provisions affected include sections relating to the surtax on business income, corporate excise taxes, S corporation taxes, taxes on security corporations, taxes on Part A income (in general, unearned income), bank taxes, excise taxes on alcoholic beverages and cigarettes, excise taxes on deeds, estate taxes, payments to the Commonwealth relating to horse and dog racing, payments to the Commonwealth relating to boxing and sparring matches, taxes on utility companies, gasoline taxes, taxes on insurance companies, excise taxes on motor vehicles, taxes on urban redevelopment corporations, sales tax, use tax, room occupancy excise taxes, and taxes on proceeds from raffles and bazaars.

The proposed law also contains a provision that if any sections of the law are held to be invalid, all other sections of the law are to remain in effect.

QUESTION 4 – Law Proposed by Initiative Petition

Do you approve of a law summarized below, on which no vote was taken by the Senate or House of Representatives before May 2, 1990?

SUMMARY

This proposed law would change the state election laws governing the establishment of political parties and the nomination of candidates.

The proposed law would allow voters to register under a political designation other than “Independent” and in addition to the two political parties previously recognized by law (Republican or Democrat), if at least fifty voters request to be permitted to do so. It would allow any group to qualify as a political party under Massachusetts law if at least one percent of the total number of registered voters register to vote using that group’s political designation, or if at least three percent of the votes cast in the preceding election for any statewide office were cast for a candidate running under that group’s political designation.

The proposed law would set the minimum number of signatures needed on independent or minor party nomination papers for state office at one-half of one percent (1/2%) of the entire vote cast in the previous state election for governor (as compared to 2% as of 1989), and would also establish this number of signatures as the upper limit needed for major party candidates. The proposed law would also permit voters to sign the nomination papers of any number of candidates for the same office, would require that all blank forms to be used for nomination papers and initiative and referendum petitions be no more than 8½” x 14” in size, and would allow signatures to be collected on exact copies of those forms.

QUESTION 5 – Law Proposed by Initiative Petition

Do you approve of a law summarized below, on which no vote was taken by the Senate or House of Representatives before May 2, 1990?

SUMMARY

This proposed law would regulate the distribution to cities and towns of the Local Aid Fund, which consists of at least 40% of the revenue generated by the state income, sales, and corporate taxes, as well as the balance of the State Lottery Fund.

Subject to appropriation by the legislature, the State Treasurer would distribute the Local Aid Fund to cities and towns on a quarterly basis, and each city or town would receive at least the same amount of local aid it received in the previous fiscal year unless the total Local Aid Fund decreases.

In fiscal year 1992, if there has been any increase over the fiscal year 1989 fund, half of the increase would be distributed in accordance with the distribution formula used for fiscal year 1989, and half would be distributed to each city and town in proportion to its population.

In each year after 1992, if the fund increases, the excess would be distributed through a formula devised by the state Secretary of Administration and Finance, with the advice and consent of the Local Government Advisory Committee. If the fund decreases after 1992, each town or city will have the amount it receives decreased by the same percentage.

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This proposed law also requires that the Treasurer publish an annual report about the Local Aid Fund, that the state Auditor publish an annual audit of the Account, and that the Secretary of Administration and Finance issue to each city and town an estimate of funds it will receive from the Local Aid Fund.

The public hearing opened at 8:20 P.M. All five members of the Planning Board were present. Seven interested parties attended.

Attorney Robert Capobianco was present representing the Molinari family.

The application involves a request to extend the single family zone. The neighbors would like to keep the area residential. All residents have signed the petition to rezone. Mrs. Borgani withdrew her name from this petition.

The land in this area is accessible only through a dead-end street.

The Town Planner stated there are present problems regarding the zone line between the residential and industrial areas. The entire area should be reviewed, including Route 109. This is an established residential area and should remain so.

Atty. Capobianco stated there is industrial land on both sides of the subject property. More thought should go into this area.

Mr. Mazzone is in favor of the residential zoning. He stated this area became a residential subdivision in 1987.

The hearing was continued to September 19, 1989 and all members were present.

The Town Planner suggested incorporating more land. The lots in this area are under separate ownership and the only access is Broad Street and Fairview Avenue making this area inappropriate for industrial zoning. There is a need to look at the whole area.

The Board agreed with the Town Planner for the need of a more comprehensive study of the area.

At 10:35 p.m. Michael Parente moved to close the public hearing and transmit an unfavorable recommendation to Town Meeting. John Tessicini seconded. Unanimous of 5.

The Monitors reported 165 present, a sufficient number to constitute a quorum.

The Town Reports were made available to all Town Meeting Members. The Report covers eighteen months, from July 1, 1988 thru December 31, 1989.

The Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, Dino DeBartolomeis, gave the following report.

Dear Town Meeting Members,

We are ready to begin our Town Meeting for Fiscal Year '91. After much work and many hours of deliberation, our budget is balanced. During the past year state aid has decreased drastically, Town Revenues decreased due to the economy and we have had to reduce the deficit by not filling much needed positions in both the Police and Fire Departments. We have cut General Government, Debt Service and Human Service budgets by \$472,000. The Town will now proceed with a self-insurance policy, saving about \$300,000.

Department Heads have cooperated totally in reducing their budgets. The Finance Committee, under the leadership of Atty. John Sammarco, has worked endlessly during the past year. They have probably put in hundreds of hours effectively and diligently, working with all involved to get us to where we are today!

Innovative measures and difficult decisions have been made. We must, though, continue to explore all cost-saving methods, consolidate and streamline Town Government for the future.

The FY '91 Budget over FY '90 Budget increased by only 2.1%. The inflation rate is about 4.5 – 5.5%.

During the month of June you will be asked to render some major decisions affecting this community. Use your judgment, wisdom and intelligence in making your decision. Listen to all points of view and then decide with your vote.

I am reporting to you that Milford has some fiscal problems similar to all communities, but we are in good shape. Most towns in the area have had pneumonia while Milford has a cold.

We have dedicated employees working for you. We have a very active and concerned public which wants the very best for your Town. There are between 600-700 residents serving on various Boards, Commissions and Town Committees.

The Town Meeting process is a great forum in which many individuals determine an outcome. Don't ever lose it where only a few will decide your future.

The majority of employees are feverishly expending time and energy to provide you with efficient and productive service.

During the next year we will be facing many vital, important issues which have never confronted the town before. We, together, will use imagination, fortitude and wise management practices in meeting these challenges.

If we continue to share our ideas and work collectively, Milford will continue to provide outstanding educational opportunities and human and public safety services to the Townspeople which they deserve and need.

Rezoning Land Sumner Street From IA to RA and RB

The Public Hearing opened at 8:30 P.M. John Tessicini, John Cook and James Griffith were present. Seena Heller and Michael Parente were absent. There were two interested parties present.

The Town Engineer presented the proposal to rezone 3.65 acres from Central Industrial to General Residential (RA) and Single Family Residential (RB).

The purpose of the rezoning is to correct a drafting error which was discovered last year when the Zoning Map was updated and redrafted.

The property in question was intended to be rezoned from Industrial to Residential at a Special Town Meeting on June 21, 1972, to allow the construction of the Birmingham Court Housing Project. Section 9. Budget Estimates. PROHIBITING FOSSIL FUEL POWER GENERATING PLANTS

The public hearing was opened at 7:45 P.M. with all members of the Planning Board present. Fifty-four interested parties attended. The Town Planner's report was incorporated into the record. Miss White's extensive research resulted in the projection of a power shortage in the area starting during the period 1991 to 1995.

During the three-hour public hearing, all parties were heard and many concerns were addressed. However, there were several issues that required further study so it was decided to schedule a special meeting. At 10:50 p.m. Mr. Cook moved to close the public hearing and take the matter under advisement, seconded by Mr. Griffith. Unanimous vote of 5.

At a special meeting on June 12, 1990 the Planning Board specifically discussed the zoning issues to be considered.

It was determined that if this amendment is passed by Town Meeting it will not provide the zoning protection which is intended. Further research by the board confirmed the fact that a public utility, with State approval, can be located even in a community which has placed a total ban on power generating plants.

Such an action by the public utility and the State overrides all zoning prohibitions by the Town and the Town has no controls whatsoever.

An immediate example of this situation is the experience of the Town of Uxbridge which has prohibited all power plants. Yet Uxbridge is now being considered as the site for a Boston Edison power generating plant.

On the other hand, Town Counsel Moody has advised us that a zoning use allowing power generating plants through issuance of a Special permit by the Zoning Board of Appeals will protect the Town.

The Department of Public Utilities will defer to reasonable conditions imposed by a Zoning Board of Appeals, thus giving the Town control.

The Board also listened to a very comprehensive report from Dr. Alfred Scaramelli, the Town's Environmental Consultant.

Dr. Scaramelli conducted a review of Enron's further study on environmental issues, such as effects on the Charles River, Electromagnetic Field, Air Quality and Noise Abatement.

In a very technical and detailed presentation, he demonstrated to the Board that Enron has adequately addressed all of the aforementioned environmental issues and that in his opinion the gas-fired power generation plant proposed by Enron will be safe, clean and no threat to the environment.

After much discussion and evaluation, the Planning Board determined that a total ban of power generating facilities would not fulfill the intent of this amendment. On the contrary, the Town will

become vulnerable and exposed to State regulations dealing with the location of power generating plants.

John Cook moved to transmit an UNFAVORABLE recommendation to the Town Meeting. Seconded by James Griffith. Unanimous vote of 5.

A. A motion was made to "Move the previous question" by Mr. James Melanson.

B. The vote on "Moving the question."

During the three-hour public hearing, all parties were heard and many concerns were addressed. However, there were several issues that require further study so it was decided to schedule a special meeting. At 10:50 P.M. Mr. Cook moved to close the public hearing and take the matter under advisement, seconded by Mr. Griffith. Unanimous vote of 5.

At a special meeting on June 12, 1990 the Planning Board specifically discussed the following zoning issues to be considered:

1. Power generating plants would be limited to ONLY gas fueled plants and only in the Industrial B Zoning District. Plants fueled by oil, coal or fuel other than gas would be prohibited in all Zoning Districts.
2. Gas fueled plants would be permitted only upon issuance of a Special Permit by the Zoning Board of Appeals following a public hearing.
3. Recommendations for a Special Permit are required from the Planning Board, Conservation Commission and the Board of Health.
4. The Zoning Board of Appeals may approve or deny a Special Permit taking into consideration the health, safety or general welfare of the citizens of Milford.
5. The Zoning Board of Appeals can impose specific requirements which become mandatory under the Special Permit. Further, the facility is subject to Site Plan Review by the Planning Board.
6. Any violation of the Special Permit allows the Town to take appropriate legal action in Superior Court for remedy, without involving State agencies.
7. Town Counsel Moody has advised the board that an allowed use through issuance of a Special Permit will protect the Town from the State's override of all zoning issues in locating a public utility.
8. It is imperative to create the specific new Zoning Category entitled "Gas Fueled Power Generating Plant" because our Zoning By-Law presently has a broad and unspecified category entitled "Public Utility" which permits that use in every Zoning District in town (Commercial, Industrial and Residential).

The Planning Board determined that the adoption of this zoning amendment would provide the maximum protection for the Town.

John Tessicini moved to transmit a FAVORABLE recommendation to Town Meeting. Seconded by James Griffith. Unanimous vote of 5.

- C. A lengthy discussion took place relative to the proposed Zoning By-Law change.
- D. An amendment was made by Michael Nunes from Precinct 2 to refer the matter to committee: (Exhibit 1)

"I move to refer the matter to committee to be appointed by the Moderator from among the Town Meeting membership. - S 80 - 06 - 30 W** A distance of 1006.35 feet by said Lot 186A, Lot 187A, 188A, 190A, 191A, 192A, 193A and a portion of Lot 194A to a railroad spike at a point of curvature at the easterly end of said Robert Road; thence
- N 02 - 10 - 40 W** A distance of 50.46 feet by said Robert Road to the point of beginning.

Said Joseph Road is generally fifty feet in width, contains 1.53 acres, more or less, and is 1339.66 feet in length and is shown on a plan entitled: "Layout Plan of Joseph Road in Milford, Mass., By: Board of Selectmen, Scale: 40 feet to an inch, Date: June 18, 1990, Guerriere & Halnon, Inc., Engineering and Land Surveying, 333 West Street, Milford, Mass."

It was moved: That the Town accept as and for a public way a private way known as Joseph Road for a distance of 1,331 ft., more or less, more fully described in the Report of the Selectmen dated September 19, 1990 as stated in the Article above.

VOICE VOTE UNANIMOUS -- PASSED.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of \$20,000, said sum to be added to those funds appropriated under Article 8 of the May 14, 1986 Special Town Meeting, to be expended under the jurisdiction of the Board of Selectmen for the purpose of upgrading the electrical service, the installation of an emergency generator, installation of a sub-panel to handle dispatch requirements, and other related work necessary for the proper functioning of equipment at the Police Station, or take any other action in relation thereto.

(Board of Selectmen)

It was moved: That the Town transfer the sum of \$4,461.10 from the On-Street Parking Fund Account No. 26-003-3251-01 together with the sum of \$15,538.90 from funds remaining from sales of bonds, Account No. 26-003-3280-11, said total sum of \$20,000 to be added to those funds appropriated under Article 8 of the May 14, 1986 Annual Town Meeting, to be expended under the jurisdiction of the Board of Selectmen for the purpose of upgrading the electrical service, the installation of an emergency generator, installation of a sub-panel to handle dispatch requirements, and other related work necessary for the proper functioning of equipment at the Police Station.

VOICE VOTE UNANIMOUS -- PASSED.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept an Equal Educational Opportunity Grant for Fiscal Year 1991 in the amount of \$404,941 under the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 70A, Section 5, as inserted by Chapter 188 of the Acts of 1985. Said sum shall be paid by the Commonwealth to and expended by the Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional School District Committee for direct services expenditure, or take any other action in relation thereto.

(Blackstone Valley Regional Voc. School District)

It was moved: That the Town accept an Equal Educational Opportunity Grant for Fiscal Year 1991 in the amount of \$404,941 under the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 70A, Section 5, as inserted by Chapter 188 of the Acts of 1985. Said sum shall be paid by the Commonwealth to and expended by the Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional School District Committee for direct services expenditures.

VOICE VOTE UNANIMOUS -- PASSED.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of \$1,400,000 to be spent under the jurisdiction of the Board of Sewer Commissioners for the purpose of design and construction of a Charles River Interceptor Line or lines and the design and construction of a South Milford Sewer Pumping Station; and further, to direct how said sum shall be raised, whether from the current tax levy, by borrowing or otherwise, and how expended, or take any other action in relation thereto.

(Board of Sewer Commissioners)

James Melanson, Chairman of the Sewer Board, gave an explanation of the Article relative to the bonding issue.

Several Town Meeting Members discussed the merit of the Article. A detailed account can be heard from the tape on the entire session of this Town Meeting.

It was moved: That the Town borrow the sum of \$1,400,000 for the purpose of financing the design and construction of a Charles River Interceptor Line or lines and the design and construction of a South Milford Sewer Pumping Station, including, without limitation, all costs thereof as defined in Section 1 of Chapter 29C of the General Laws; that to meet this, the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, is authorized to borrow \$1,400,000 and issue bonds or notes therefor under Clause 1 of Section 7 of Chapter 44 of the General Laws and/or Chapter 29c of the General Laws; that such bonds or notes shall be general obligations of the Town unless the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, determines that they should be issued as limited obligations and may be secured by local system revenues as defined in Section 1 of Chapter 29C; that the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, is authorized to borrow all or a portion of such amount from the Massachusetts Water Pollution Abatement Trust established pursuant to Chapter 29C and in connection therewith to enter into a loan agreement and/or security agreement with the Trust and otherwise to contract with the Trust and the Department of Environmental Protection with respect to such loan and for any federal or state aid available for the project or for the financing thereof; that the Board of Sewer Commissioners is authorized to enter into a project regulatory agreement with the Department of Environmental Protection, to expend all funds available for the project and to take any other action necessary to carry out the project.

STANDING VOTE . . . 143 in favor: 5 opposed . . . PASSED (2/3)

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 15A of the General By-Laws of the Town, the "Dog Control Law," by striking the third sentence from Section 3A thereof and inserting in place thereof the following:

"The fee for such a license shall be as follows:

Female Dog	\$10.00
Female Dog, Spayed	6.00
Male Dog	10.00
Male Dog, Neutered	6.00
Kennel (4 dogs or less)	25.00
Kennel (5 to 10 dogs)	50.00

or take any other action thereof.

(Town Clerk)

It was moved: To pass over the article.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of \$17,500, said sum to be added to the Library Salaries Account No. 601-5110, as voted under

Article 4 of the June 11, 1990 Annual Town Meeting, or take any other action in relation thereto.
(Board of Library Trustees)

Mr. Edward Bertorelli presented the article and gave an explanation for it.

A lengthy discussion took place relative to the article by Mr. Hayes, Mr. Paul Curran, Atty. John Sammarco, Mr. Rodriques, Mr. Latham and others. A tape of the discussion is available in the Town Clerk's office.

A motion to "Move the question . . ."

113 in favor; 15 opposed . . . Motion carried.

Action then came on the article.

It was moved: That the Town transfer the sum of \$17,500 from the Excess and Deficiency Account, said sum to be added to the Library Salaries Account No. 601-5110, as voted under Article 4 of the June 11, 1990 Annual Town Meeting.

VOICE VOTE UNANIMOUS -- DEFEATED.
