Steps To Success in 4-H

Key aspects of the 4-H program have been standardized to help make the program consistent for every member regardless of which Club or County they participate in.

In order to receive a pin and stripe, each member must follow the guidelines under "Project Completion". This includes being a member in good standing, attending a minimum of 6 hours of project instruction, and completing the Annual Project Report (APR). Primary members are not required to have project completion to receive the pin and stripe.



There are also special requirements to participate in the Sacramento County Fair as a 4-H member. Sacramento 4-H members will have to attend a minimum of 6 hours of project instruction and 5 community club meetings, prior to the fair registration deadline in April. Please communicate with your 4-H Club Leader if you have any questions or concerns about meeting those requirements. The Sacramento County Fair will also have rules and guidelines that must be followed. Visit the Sacramento County Fair website to review their competition handbooks, which should be posted by December.

We are considering having another Farm Day event in the spring. If you are interested, please email Cyndee Plaskett.







4-H ON THE WILD SIDE



Teens as Teachers Enhance Environmental Education and Personal Skills Through Service Learning

Children from low-income communities tend to have limited access and experience with the natural environment. 4-H On the Wild Side (OTWS), a project of the Sacramento County 4-H Youth Development Program, enables 4th, 5th, and 6th graders from low-income communities (139 elementary school students participated in 2015) to experience the air, land, and water of Camp Gold Hollow in Nevada City. After their Saturday and Sunday at camp, it is hoped that the children who participated increase their science literacy and that they consider future careers in science.

Planning and preparation for OTWS takes almost a year. Teen volunteers from area high schools plan and lead the activities in partnership with adult coaches. Both the teen volunteers and adult coaches are trained in both curricula and in how to teach inquiry-based science. From planning and leading activities, teen volunteers develop organizational, public speaking, and teamwork skills that will aid them in future careers.

OTWS is more than acquiring knowledge and skill building for campers and volunteers. It is a lot of fun as 4-H staff, volunteers, and the children sing camp songs in front of a campfire, eat delicious S'mores, and sleep under the clear, starry skies. 



4-H Horse Project

A Visit to the Black Hills Wild Mustang Sanctuary In Hot Springs, North Dakota by Lauren Mann, Franklin Horse Project


Last March during spring break, I was able to tour the Black Hills Wild Mustang Sanctuary in Hot Springs, North Dakota. This was the location for many films, including "Crazy Horse", "Dances with Wolves" and "Hidalgo".

There are three protected herds here in the Black Hills near Mount Rushmore. They are American Mustangs, Spanish Mustangs and Choctaw. It is home to over 600 horses that run free on 11,000 acres of land. The Cheyenne river flows through it in all four directions (north, south, east, and west) and Native Indians still use parts of the sanctuary for their sacred rituals.

I took a two hour bus tour through the sanctuary and wondered if we'd see any of the horses. I imagined that being "wild" the herd would occasionally thunder past us and we'd catch a glimpse. Imagine my pleasant surprise when we not only saw the horses, but they often stopped the bus and we were able to get out and touch the horses!

Horses are trusting of humans by nature. They need to be taught to fear us. There were a few horses on the property that had been abused and therefore skittish of us, but most of them freely wandered up to us. I noticed a few differences in the horses I usually work with. These horses had no shoes and their hooves were a bit over-sized and hard as a rock. Their manes and tails were un-brushed and often had thistles knotted in them. They were not clean, but dusty like a happy kindergartner who just finished making mud-pies.

Many of the horses, although wild, have been long time residents here on the sanctuary, so they have been given names. One of the fun parts of the tour is trying to match up the horse in person with a photo gallery we were given. We spied many of the "regulars". "Prairie Lark" is a black mare that has a filly that also live here called "Prairie Lonesome". "Ghost Dancer" lives up to her name in that she is a white paint horse that was born here on the open range and is shy and elusive. "Honey" is a beautiful red colored gelding and has zebra stripes on his black legs. During our visit, I learned that they eat \$500,000 annually in hay on the sancturayr and tend to be healthier than domesticated horses. The oldest mare here is a whopping 35 years old! As herd animals, the humans who run the sanctuary need to introduce new arrivals during the middle of the night so they won't be rejected by the other horses. I recommend a stop to this amazing horse kingdom. It is worth the trip to see horses in their natural setting enjoying their freedom.




