0-6 Months
Repeats the same sounds
$\square$ Frequently coos, gurgles, and makes pleasure sounds
$\square$ Uses a different cry to express different needs
$\square$ Smiles when spoken to
$\square$ Recognizes voices
$\square$ Localizes sound by turning head
$\square$ Listens to speech
$\square$ Uses the phonemes /b/, /p/, and /m/ in babbling
$\square$ Uses sounds or gestures to indicate wants
7-12 Months
$\square$ Understands no and hot
$\square$ Responds to simple requests
$\square$ Understands and responds to own name
$\square \quad$ Listens to and imitates some sounds
$\square$ Recognizes words for common items (e.g., cup, shoe, juice)
$\square \quad$ Babbles using long and short groups of sounds
$\square$ Uses a song-like intonation pattern when babbling
$\square$ Uses a large variety of sounds in babbling
$\square$ Imitates some adult speech sounds and intonation patterns
$\square$ Uses speech sounds rather than only crying to get attention
$\square$ Listens when spoke to
$\square$ Uses sound approximations
$\square$ Begins to change babbling to jargon
$\square$ Uses speech intentionally for the first time
$\square$ Uses nouns almost exclusively
$\square$ Expressively uses 1 to 3 words
$\square$ Understands simple commands

13-18 Months
$\square$ Uses adult-like intonation patterns
$\square$ Repeats adult-like words and phrases
$\square$ Uses jargon to fill gaps in fluency
$\square$ Omits some initial consonants and almost all final consonants
$\square$ Produces mostly unintelligible speech
$\square$ Follows simple commands
$\square$ Receptively identifies 1 to 3 body parts
$\square$ Expressively uses 3 to 20 or more words (mostly nouns)
$\square$ Combines gestures and vocalization
$\square$ Makes requests for more of desired items
19-24 Months
$\square$ Uses words more frequently than jargon
$\square$ Expressively uses 50 to 100 or more words
$\square$ Understands 300 or more words
$\square$ Starts to combine nouns and verbs
$\square$ Begins to use pronouns
$\square$ Maintains unstable voice control
$\square$ Uses appropriate intonation for questions
$\square$ Is approximately 25-50\% intelligible to strangers
$\square$ Answers "what's that?" questions
$\square$ Enjoys listening to stories
$\square$ Knows 5 body parts
$\square$ Accurately names a few familiar objects
2-3 Years
$\square$ Speech is 50-75\% understandable
$\square$ Understands "one" and "all"
$\square$ Verbalizes toilet needs (before, during, or after act)
$\square$ Requests items by name
$\square$ Names everyday objects
$\square$ Points to pictures in a book when named
$\square$ Identifies several body parts
$\square$ Follows simple commands and answers simple questions
$\square$ Enjoys listening to short stories, songs, and rhymes
$\square$ Ask 1- to 2-word questions
$\square$ Uses 3- to 4-word Phrases
$\square$ Uses some prepositions, articles, present progressive verbs, regular plurals, contractions, and irregular past tense forms
$\square$ Produces several forms of questions
$\square$ Understands "why", "who", "whose", and "how many"
$\square$ Continues use of repetition/mimicking when difficulties in speech are encountered
$\square$ Understands 500-900 or more words
$\square$ Expressively uses 50-250 or more words (rapid growth during this period)
$\square$ Exhibits multiple grammatical errors
$\square$ Understands most things said to him or her
$\square$ Frequently exhibits repetitions -especially starters, "I," and first syllables
$\square$ Speaks with a loud voice
$\square$ Increases range of pitch
$\square$ Uses vowels correctly
$\square$ Consistently uses initial consonants (although some are misarticulated)
$\square$ May leave out middle and ending consonants in words
$\square$ Uses a big variety of speech sounds
$\square$ Uses: past tense (ran, jumped), possessive (his, hers, mine, Sarah’s), and pronouns (he, she, I, they)
3-4 Years
$\square$ Understands object functions
$\square$ Understands differences in meanings (stop-go, in-on, big-little)
$\square$ Follows 2- and 3-part commands
$\square$ Asks and answers simple questions (who, what where why)
$\square$ Frequently asks questions and often demands detail in response
$\square$ Produces simple verbal analogies
$\square$ Uses language to express emotion
$\square$ Uses 4 to 5 words in sentences
$\square$ Repeats 6- to 13- syllable sentences accurately
$\square$ Identifies objects by name
$\square$ Manipulates adults and peers
$\square$ May continue to use echolalia
$\square$ Uses up to 6 words in a sentence
$\square$ Uses nouns and verbs most frequently
$\square$ Is conscious of past and future
$\square$ Has a 1,200-2,000 or more word receptive vocabulary
$\square$ Has a 800-1,500 or more word expressive vocabulary
$\square$ May repeat self often, exhibiting blocks, disturbed breathing, and facial grimaces during speech
$\square$ Increase speech rate
$\square$ Whispers
$\square$ Masters 50\% of consonants and blends
$\square$ Speech is $80 \%$ intelligible
$\square$ Sentence grammas improves although some errors still persist
$\square$ Appropriately uses "is", "are", and "am" in sentences
$\square$ Tells two events in chronological order
$\square$ Engages in long conversations
$\square$ Uses some contractions, irregular plurals, future tense verbs, and conjunctions
$\square$ Consistently uses regular plurals, possessives, and simple past tense verbs

## 4-5 Years

$\square \quad$ Imitatively counts to 5
$\square$ Understands concept of numbers up to 3
$\square$ Continues understanding of spatial concepts
$\square$ Recognizes 1 to 3 colors
$\square$ Has a receptive vocabulary of 2,800 or more words
$\square$ Counts to 10 by rote
$\square$ Listens to short simple stories
$\square$ Answers questions about function
$\square$ Uses grammatically correct sentences
$\square$ Has an expressive vocabulary of 900-2,000 or more words
$\square$ Uses sentences of 4 to 8 words
$\square$ Answers complex 2-part questions
$\square$ Asks for word definition
$\square$ Speaks at a rate of approximately 186 words per minute
$\square$ Reduces total number of repetitions
$\square$ Enjoys rhythms, rhymes, and nonsense syllables
$\square$ Produces consonants with 90\% accuracy
$\square$ Significantly reduces number of persistent sound omissions and substitutions
$\square$ Frequently omits middle consonants
$\square$ Speech is usually intelligible to strangers
$\square$ Talks about experiences at school, at friends' homes, etc.
$\square$ Accurately relays a long story
$\square$ Pays attention to a story and answers simple questions about it
$\square$ Uses some irregular plurals, possessive pronouns, future tense, reflexive pronouns, and comparative morphemes in sentences
