Toronto, believed to mean "meeting place" in Huron, has lived up to its name. Waves of immigration from Italy, Greece, China, Vietnam, Jamaica, India and Somalia, plus an influx from nearby Montreal, contributed to Toronto's maturing from "Toronto the Good" into today's fast-paced and cosmopolitan "Hollywood North." Half a million Italians, the largest Portuguese population in North America, the largest Chinese population in Canada and the country's largest gay and lesbian population all call the Toronto metropolitan area home.
