

# Patriots will win because ... They hold the important 'experienced roster' card

et's get this straight. A second-year head coach and a second-string quarterback are not going to keep the New England Patriots from winning a second-consecutive Super Bowl. Not. Going. To. Happen.

I mean, it could happen.

I will give props to the Philadelphia Eagles. They were dominant enough in the regular season with Carson Wentz at quarterback that it allowed backup-turned-starter Nick Foles to use the final stretch of regular season after Wentz went down with an injury as

a preseason of sorts. The defense was stout — and underrated, in my opinion — throughout the season, and all the new skill position players on offense have figured out their

Yet the Eagles are underdogs — dog masks and all — for a reason. These Patriots are a better, if not perfect, team.

Their biggest advantages are the obvious ones. Bill Belichick is a better coach than Doug Pederson. While Pederson has shown in his short tenure that he has better clock management than his mentor, former Eagles coach and current Kansas City Chiefs coach Andy Reid, he is going up against arguably the greatest coach in the NFL history. Look at last year's Super Bowl, the one against the Seahawks two years ago, and just look at two weeks ago against the Jaguars. Part of the reason the Patriots were able to come back in those games was Belichick's knowledge of how much time he had left to rally and what it would take to do so.

That he had Tom Brady leading the charge on offense helps too

Brady over Foles is another obvious advantage. Brady has been here before, and he's won here before. While Foles looked good in the NFC Championship game, his track record is spotty. He was able to be successful on the deep ball, which is something that Belichick and defensive coordinator Matt Patricia usually game plan to prevent.

I won't call the Patriots defense an advantage, because it isn't. The Eagles have better personnel, specifically along the front. But the gap between the two units might not be as big as some fans think. This Patriots defense is unheralded, and doesn't have a lot of big names. But it makes you work for every first down and every point. It will stymie your run game, and when you become one-dimensional and stick to passing the pressure of the pass rush will start to get to you.

Foles, please meet Trey Flowers, former Steeler James Harrison, and "I didn't even know that guy was on the ros-

While we're talking about advantages, Stephen Gostkowski may give Patriots fans gray hairs with his kicking, but this will be his fifth Super Bowl, while the Eagles' Jake Elliott is a rookie. And Patriots punter Ryan Allen might not have the biggest booming leg, but he's been consistent and his punts rarely end in touchbacks. His Philly counterpart, Donnie Jones, is a career journeyman, and his best days were almost a decade ago.

The Patriots conceivably get the checkmarks in many categories when put head-to-head with what the Eagles have to offer. The biggest, and most obvious, checkmark in the Patriots' favor is Super Bowl experience. The Eagles have just six active players who have played in the big game, including LeGarrette Blount and Chris Long with the Patriots last year. Blount also played in Super Bowl XLIX with the Patriots. New England, meanwhile, has 35 players with Super Bowl experience, which comes with the back-toback and three-in-four-years trips.

Dealing with the emotions, the pressure and the distractions in and around the game can play a big role in winning it. Nobody has more experience in successfully "ignoring the noise" than Belichick and Brady, and the rest of the been-there, done-that Patriots fall in line behind them.

If the Patriots need any extra motivation to win another Super Bowl, there's this: It could be the last chance to win a Super Bowl in the long and illustrious careers of Brady and Belichick, and the end of what might be the best dynasty the NFL has ever seen. The Patriots can't think "oh, we'll just be back next year." And they won't think that way. Belichick, Brady, Bob—er, Rob

- Rob Gronkowski and all the players the most casual fans can't name will be going all in on this game. And they're not about to let what might be their last chance at a win end in a loss.

# Eagles will win because ... They play the role of the underdog oh, so perfectly

he quarterback wearing No. 11 went down for the season, but somehow a little-known backup and an unheralded coach led their team to the franchise's third Super Bowl appearance.

In the big game, they were underdogs against an unstoppable force.

No Drew Bledsoe? No problem. Tom Brady and Bill Belichick pulled off the upset over the Rams-nick named the Greatest Show on Turf-to earn the New England Patriots' first SuperBowl title. It was one of the best sports moments of my life.

Sixteen years later, Nick Foles and Doug Pederson will help the Philadelphia Eagles do the same thing to the mighty Patriots in Super Bowl LII.

No Carson Wentz? No problem.

It's not the same thing, you might be saying.

But it's exactly the same thing. Or, at least, it's enough to not

count them out Sunday in Minnesota. This Super Bowl also has similarities to Super Bowl XLII. Remember that one, back in Feb. 2008? The New York Giants used a superb defensive line to derail the Patriots' not-quite-perfect

The Eagles, too, have an outstanding defensive line, which will be facing an offensive line that none of us has much confi-

Therefore, Brady will probably need to make some quick decisions against one of the NFL's best defenses at forcing turnovers. During the regular season, Philadelphia forced 31 turnovers—nearly two per game. They intercepted 19 passes,

which is more than one per game. Philly's offense doesn't quite measure up to New England's, but it's still one of the league's most formidable.

The Eagles in the regular season were third in points scored, one point behind the second-ranked Patriots. Philly's overall yardage ranks second, but it has balance, including the NFL's third-best running attack. That should take some of the pressure off Foles to be productive on every single down.

You know who else had a good running game? The Jacksonville Jaguars, who ranked No. 1 in the regular season, and whom the Patriots barely beat in the AFC Champion-

A friend of mine, who is a Patriots fan, told me last week that he thinks this is the worst Patriots Super Bowl team of this century.

That argument can easily be made, and that belief is especially dangerous to the Patriots because they haven't been a great Super Bowl team.

During most of the 1990s, the Super Bowl was a joke. Pretty much every game was a blowout and there was hardly any excitement.

Fortunately, blowouts haven't been a problem when New England has been involved.

Over the past 17 years, this is the eighth time that the Brady-Belichick Era Patriots have played in a Super Bowl. Last year's six-point win over the Falcons was their largest point differential out of the first seven trips — and that game went to over-

Many of our fellow Americans are sick of the Patriots going to the Super Bowl. Not me, because they usually don't play all that well and so we're pretty much guaranteed a good game.

I said this same thing last year, and I was right. New England bombed in the first half. If the Falcons made a couple of different play calls late in that game, they'd have a Vince Lombardi in the trophy case at their fancy new stadium.

Don't expect the Eagles to make the same mistake as the Falcons and Jaguars. Pederson, in only his second year as Philadelphia's coach, has earned a reputation as a risk-taker. If the Eagles take a 28-3 lead, their focus will be on adding seven more rather than on holding onto a 25-point lead.

One other thing: Pederson is 1-0 against the Patriots in the Super Bowl. He was Brett Favre's backup on Jan. 26, 1997, when Green Bay beat New England 35-21 in Super Bowl XXXI.

Speaking of backups, they have a pretty good track record in Super Bowls. Jeff Hostetler, as Phil Simms backup, led the Giants to a Super Bowl win over the Bills. Doug Williams,

Trent Dilfer, Jim Plunkett join Brady as quarterbacks who started seasons as backups but ended up guiding their teams to Super Bowl victories.

Nick Foles is the key player in Super Bowl LII. If he plays well, the Eagles will win by double digits. If he struggles, Philly still has enough to pull off a close win over the Patriots.

### **GAME 1**

# **CHIEFS 42, PATRIOTS 27**

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. — Alex Smith threw two long touchdown passes and rookie Kareem Hunt, after fumbling on his first NFL carry, scored three times as Kansas City stunned New England 42-27 in the season opener. Coming off their sensational Super Bowl rally to a fifth Lombardi Trophy, the Patriots faded badly in the second half. It was the first time the Patriots lost at Gillette Stadium when

leading at halftime, a span of 82 games. Tyreek Hill scored on a 75-yarder and Hunt put the Chiefs in front

with a 78-yarder to punctuate Kansas City's charge after trailing 17-

### GAME 2

### **PATRIOTS 36, SAINTS 20**

NEW ORLEANS — Bouncing back with a vengeance from a seasonopening loss, Tom Brady threw three touchdown passes in the first quarter for the first time in his career and eclipsed 300 yards passing in the first half for only the second time.

Brady's maiden Super Bowl triumph in the Superdome back in February 2002 is bound to be one of his fondest memories. But the 18-year veteran looked like a superior QB in his latest visit. He finished 30 of 39 for 447 yards without an interception — at least not one that counted. Saints defenders caught Brady's passes twice, but both plays were wiped out by New Orleans penalties.

# GAME 3

### **PATRIOTS 36, TEXANS 33**

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. — Tom Brady connected with Brandin Cooks for a 25-yard touchdown pass with 23 seconds left, his fifth TD throw of the game.

Brady finished 25 of 35 for 378 yards as New England won its fifth straight regular-season meeting with Houston and seventh of eight overall. Cooks caught five passes for 131 yards and pair of scores. It was the fifth multi-touchdown game and eighth 100-yard game of

Texans rookie Deshaun Watson was strong in his second career start. The Patriots were thin on the edge without linebacker Dont'a Hightower for the second straight week, and Watson took advantage, completing 22 of 33 passes for 301 yards and two touchdowns.

# GAME 4

# **PANTHERS 33, PATRIOTS 30**

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. — Graham Gano hit a 48-yard field goal as time expired, and the Carolina Panthers stunned the New England Patriots 33-30.

The winner served as redemption for Gano, who missed an extra point in the third quarter.

# **GAME 5**

# **PATRIOTS 19. BUCS 14**

TAMPA, Fla. — Tom Brady threw for 303 yards and one touchdown, and New England's porous defense showed signs of improvement in a 19-14 victory over the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

The Super Bowl champions rebounded from a last-second loss to Carolina, despite Brady turning the ball over twice — on his first interception in eight regular-season games and a fumble on one of Tampa Bay's three sacks.

# **GAME 6**

# **PATRIOTS 24, JETS 17**

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Tom Brady set the NFL record for regularseason victories by a quarterback, getting his 187th and brkeaking a tie with Peyton Manning and Brett Favre for the record.

The Patriots were playing their first game in 10 days and fell behind 14-0 in the second quarter against the surprising Jets.

# GAME 7

# **PATRIOTS 23, FALCONS 7**

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. — Tom Brady threw two touchdown passes and New England toyed with Atlanta Falcons for a 23-7 win in a fog-filled Super Bowl rematch that wasn't particularly super. New England scored the final 31 points to win the NFL championship in February.

# GAME 8

# **PATRIOTS 21, CHARGERS 13**

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. — Tom Brady passed for 333 yards and a touchdown for New England, and Stephen Gostkowski added four

It was the fourth straight victory for the Patriots (6-2). The loss snapped a three-game win streak for the Chargers.

# GAME 9

# **PATRIOTS 41, BRONCOS 16**

DENVER — Tom Brady threw three touchdown passes and New England matched its own AFC record with its 12th consecutive road victory, pummeling the Denver Broncos 41-16.

Avoiding Von Miller all night and throwing for 266 yards on 25-of-34 passing, Brady improved to 8-9 against the Broncos, the only team he has a losing record against, and won for just the fourth time in 11 trips to Denver

# **GAME 10**

# **PATRIOTS 33, RAIDERS 8**


MEXICO CITY — Tom Brady felt right at home in his first appearance in Mexico by throwing for 339 yards and three touchdowns, to the delight of an adoring crowd, in New England's 33-8 victory over Oakland.

Brady completed his first 12 passes and picked apart Oakland's suspect defense to chants of "Brady! Brady!" from an amped-up crowd at Azteca Stadium.

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. — Tom Brady tossed four touchdown passes

# **GAME 13**

# **DOLPHINS 27, PATRIOTS 20**

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. — Tom Brady was intercepted twice by Xavien Howard and held without a third-down conversion, and Miami snapped the New England's eight-game winning streak with a surprising 27-20 victory.

The Dolphins were 11-point underdogs at home, but they kept the Patriots (10-3) from clinching their ninth consecutive AFC East title.

# **GAME 14**

# **PATRIOTS 27, STEELERS 24**

PITTSBURGH — Tom Brady fed Rob Gronkowski repeatedly to set up Dion Lewis' go-ahead 8-yard touchdown with 56 seconds remaining and Ben Roethlisberger was intercepted in the end zone with 5

The Patriots ended Pittsburgh's eight-game winning streak. Brady threw for 298 yards with two touchdowns and an interception. Gronkowski, fresh off a one-game suspension, finished with nine receptions for 168 yards, including four on the winning drive.

# **GAME 15**

# **PATRIOTS 37, BILLS 16**

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. — Tom Brady passed for a pair of touchdowns and the Patriots stayed on track to claim home-field advantage throughout the AFC playoffs.

Dion Lewis caught a touchdown pass and rushed for a 4-yard score. He carried 24 times for a career-high 129 yards. It was just his second-career 100-yard game. Mike Gillislee, active for the first time in six games, added a 1-yard rushing touchdown

# **GAME 16**

# PATRIOTS 26, JETS 6

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. — Dion Lewis ran for a touchdown and caught a scoring pass, helping the Patriots clinch home-field advantage throughout the AFC playoffs.

The win clinched the seventh 13-win season for the Patriots (13-3), second in NFL history to San Francisco's nine seasons. It was also Bill Belichick's 250th career regular-season win, moving him into a tie with Tom Landry for third all-time among head coaches.

# **PATRIOTS 35, TITANS 6**

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. — Tom Brady passed for three touchdowns and 337 yards, and New England cruised past Tennessee 35-14 to advance to their seventh consecutive AFC championship game. It was Brady's 10th career postseason game with at least three TD tosses, moving him past Joe Montana for the most in NFL history. James White caught a touchdown pass and ran for another, and

The Titans (10-8) took an early 7-0 lead, but New England scored 35 straight points to take control.

Danny Amendola had 11 catches for 112 yards.

Marcus Mariota completed 22 of 37 passes for 254 yards and two touchdowns, but was under duress for most of the second half. He was sacked eight times, a Patriots playoff record.

New England also held Derrick Henry to just 28 yards rushing on 12 carries.

# **AFC CHAMPIONSHIP**

# **PATRIOTS 24, JAGUARS 20**

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. — Tom Brady shook off a hand injury and threw a 4-yard touchdown pass to Danny Amendola with 2:48 remaining, rallying the New England Patriots back to the Super Bowl with a 24-20 comeback victory over the Jacksonville Jaguars in the AFC championship.

Brady, wearing a black bandage on his right hand, showed no signs of being hampered. And, with the game — and possibly the season — on the line, the Patriots star came up big again. Brady finished 26 of 38 for 290 yards and two touchdowns for the Patriots (15-3). The Jaguars led 20-10 early in the fourth quarter, but couldn't hold against the defending champions.

**COWBOYS 6, EAGLES 0**



# Super showdown

om Brady and the New England Patriots will try to match the Pittsburgh Steelers' six Super Bowl trophies when they face the Eagles in Minneapolis. They'll face a Philadelphia Eagles team looking for their first Lombardi Trophy.

Nick Foles, the backup QB who was thrust into the starting role when Carson Wentz blew out his left knee last month, led the Eagles to a 38-7 rout of the Minnesota Vikings in the NFC championship game.

The Eagles, who last won an NFL title in 1960, several years before the first Super Bowl, met the Patriots in the Super Bowl after the 2004 season with New England prevailing 24-21. It's the eighth Super Bowl appearance for Brady and coach Bill Belichick, who have won five times including last year's 34-28 overtime rally against the Atlanta Falcons.

The Patriots clearly have the edge when it comes to experience - 32 players have a combined 60 games in the title game. The Eagles have just seven players on the active roster who've won a Super Bowl. The Patriots believe what's important is this: Philadelphia is playing its best football.





# Tafoya ready for some time in the spotlight

BLOOMINGTON, Minn. (AP) — Michele Tafoya was a 28-year-old sports talk radio host in the heart of college basketball country, embarking on a long-desired vocation in an unforgiving field when she felt her first career boost from a bold on-air predic-

Cal will beat Duke.

That's what Tafoya told her listeners that defining March day in 1993 on WAQS-AM in Charlotte, North Carolina, a place with an abundance of ardent NCAA Tournament followers and, naturally, self-appoint-

The Blue Devils were the two-time defending national champions and an established power from a haven state of hoops.

The Golden Bears, despite the presence of star point guard Jason Kidd and a noslouch No. 6 seed in the Midwest Region, had no such pedigree. They also happened to be the team from Tafoya's alma mater, prompting predictable howls of foolish bi-

Well, guess who won that second-round

Cal 82, Duke 77, was the final score. Apologies were the star of the show the follow-

"I give the fans credit. They all called in. The phones were lit for hours. Everybody was saying, 'We're sorry we doubted you. Clearly, you knew what you were talking about. You weren't picking with your heart," Tafoya said. "My stature as a person with some knowledge shot up that day in a 24-hour period.'

She continues to call  $\bar{t}$ he Twin Cities area home, with her husband, Mark, 12-year-old son, Tyler, and 9-year-old daughter, Olivia.

"She usually knows more than what's go-

ing on more than we do, because she talks with so many different players through the course of the week," NBC analyst Cris Collinsworth said

You can tell the respect level that the players have and the coaches have for her. It's a difficult job.'

Asking questions of coaches and players in real time on the field amid the intense NFL atmosphere with millions of viewers critiquing word choice, speaking style and wardrobe is a daunting assignment.

As is working in the professional sports environment as a woman, a glass ceiling that Tafoya has helped smash with predecessors such as Lesley Visser and contemporaries such as Suzy Kolber.

"I don't think I have to fight it anymore. I've been doing this long enough. I'm old now," Tafoya said Wednesday at the Mall of America, the media headquarters for Super Bowl week. 'You do this long enough, and people

start to trust you. It was tough for quite a while the first few years, but that's why I always felt like I had to prepare like crazy."

Tafoya has been doing promotional work for Secret deodorant, with a campaign spotlighting women in the football world who've overcome the catcalls, prejudice and machismo to stand out in the field.

"I've never been one of those 'I am woman, hear me roar' kind of people. I'm more about being a professional. I'm going to do my job. I'm going to do it to the best of my ability," she said. "I don't care if you're a man or a woman.'

FROM NICK FOLES seeking to lead Philadelphia to its first Super Bowl title to Tom Brady looking to become the first quarterback to win six, there are plenty of subplots that will get a lot of attention leading up to the Big Game. Here's some others that fans should keep an eye on:

# THUMBS-UP

Brady will certainly be asked a lot about his injured right thumb even though it didn't appear to bother him in the AFC championship despite needing stitches and missing practice time during the week. Don't expect Bill Belichick to fret over his quarterback's health, however." I mean, look, Tom did a great job and he's a tough guy, we all know that, all right?" Belichick said after Brady completed 26 of 38 passes for 290 yards and two TDs against Jacksonville in the AFC championship. "But, I mean, we're not talking about open-heart surgery here."

# **GRONK'S STATUS**

Rob Gronkowski missed last year's playoffs and Brady is hoping his top target doesn't sit out this Super Bowl, too. The big tight end was knocked out of the AFC championship with a head injury after a helmet-to-helmet hit in the first half of New England's come-from-behind 24-20 win over the Jaguars. Gronkowski caught just one pass, for 21 yards, against Jacksonville and his injury ended a streak of six consecutive playoff games with a touchdown. Gronkowski led the league with 1,084 yards on 69 receptions this season.

# DIFFERENT STROKES

The Patriots have three players in Gronkowski, receiver Brandin Cooks and running back Dion Lewis who had more than 1,000 scrimmage yards. The Eagles are the first team since the 1990 Giants to reach the Super Bowl with none. But the Eagles

do have the league's third-ranked rushing offense with three productive backs in Jay Ajayi, LeGarrette Blount (who has 10 TDs in 10 career playoff games) and Corey Clement, whom they've relied on to take the pressure off Foles after losing Carson Wentz.

# PILE ON POINTS

The Eagles struggled to find an offensive rhythm without Wentz, scoring just 34 points over a three-game span before the NFC championship, when they broke out for 38 against the Vikings. Asked what clicked offensively, Foles said it was the team's mindset: "We weren't going to be timid. We weren't going to be fearful." That would be a good blueprint to follow against the Patriots, who won't be intimidated by the big stage. Settling for field goals and not touchdowns is a recipe for defeat against New England.

# **GETTING SACKED**

Although Brady is playing like he's 30 and not 40 years old with a league-best 4,577 yards and an AFC-best 32 TDs, he's getting hit a lot more than he did last year. After getting sacked just 15 times in 2016, Brady was sacked 32 times during the season and the Jaguars got to him three times in the AFC championship. That hasn't stopped the Patriots from having the league's second-ranked offense.

## COMEBACK KIDS

Brady has led the Patriots on a game-winning, fourth-quarter drive in all five of his Super Bowl wins, rallying from 25 points down to beat Atlanta last year and 10 points down to beat Seattle three years ago, overcoming a one-point deficit against Carolina in 2004 and leading tiebreaking drives against St. Louis (2001) and Philadelphia (2005). Brady came up short in two last-minute desperation drives in both losses to the Giants.

Among the Boston sports teams, yes, the Patriots were the laughing stocks. They were the most poorly-run organization. Schaeffer/Sullivan/Foxboro Stadium was a minor-league facility, and the franchise's first two owners, Billy Sullivan and Victor Kiam, were in over their heads. In Sullivan's case, he was usually drowning financially, too.

And it translated onto the field. Even when the Patriots had enough talent to win, the leadership, coaches, general managers and owners would find a way to screw it up by letting any player who asked for more money hold out or by firing their coach as they were winning their first division championship.

But the Patriots were rarely the laughing stock of the league. It was even worse than

They were irrelevant.

They could only strive to garner headlines for their futility that teams such as the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Detroit Lions, New York Jets and New Orleans Saints did in the last three decades of the 20th century.

Irepeat—the New England Patriots were irrelevant. Even when they were good, they were an afterthought.

In the late 1970s, the Patriots had a brief run as the hot, up-and-coming team, poised to challenge AFC powers Pittsbugh, Oakland and Miami. Howard Cosell called tight end Russ Francis "all-world," and Steve Grogan was considered one of the league's top young quarterbacks. But they underachieved, winning one division title and zero playoff games.

The Steelers, Raiders and Dolphins, and once Earl Campbell arrived, the Houston Oilers, dominated the conversation whenever the AFC's top contenders were debated. Even the San Diego Chargers drew more buzz because they were "Air Coryell," while the Patriots were ground-and-pound boring.

Fans craved any national recognition for the Patriots. We watched the Sunday pregame shows and NFL Films highlights religiously, wondering if we would ever see anything on a Patriots player. There might be one feature for every five on the Oilers.

Those Patriot teams only showed up on the league's showcase event of that time, Monday Night Football, once or twice a season, about half as much as those other AFC contenders.

After some lean years in the 1980s, including the team's first true national laughingstock moment, the Stupor Bowl against the Baltimore Colts in 1981, the Patriots were good again in the mid-1980s. They made a still-unfathomable run of winning three straight road games to make the Super Bowl in the 1985-86 season. As we all know, they ultimately succumbed to the most dominant team of my lifetime, the Chicago Bears.

That Bears team had a lot of strong personalities, starting with Jim McMahon and William "the Refrigerator" Perry, so they commanded the vast majority of the national media's attention in the build-up to Super Bowl XX. After the game ended, they remained the center of everyone's attention, even after Ron Borges broke a story in the Boston Globe that many of the Patriots players were abusing drugs during the season. Looking back, it seems odd that the scandal didn't resonate more nationally. But again, it involved a team that didn't have the brand recognition of a growing list of other NFL teams.

That team quickly faded into mediocrity, then took its second crack at becoming a national laughingstock in 1990 with a 1-15 team and the Lisa Olson incident.

That changed quickly with what turned out to be the seminal moment of the Patriots as we know them today—the hiring of Bill Parcells as head coach in 1993. I can remember literally pinching myself when Parcells was hired to make sure I wasn't dreaming. I could not believe my New England Patriots were about to be hired by a guy who was already a coaching legend. Why would he go to New England?

But the Patriots were never going to take the spotlight away from Brett Favre, Reggie White and the Green Bay Packers, but it wouldn't have mattered anyway. The story

that Parcells was going to the New York Jets broke in the week leading up to the game, so that was all anyone talked about when it came to the Patriots. And once he left, the Patriots were once again an afterthought, good but not good enough. Bad, but not bad enough.

We all know what happened after that. The Patriots hired Bill Belichick, drafted Tom Brady and pulled off one of the greatest upsets in Super Bowl history against the St. Louis

But in America's football consciousness, they were a Cinderella story waiting for the clock to strike midnight. Down the road, the Rams were the team to continue watching.

Of course, the Patriots won two of the next three Super Bowls while the national football cognoscenti struggled to figure out why they were so successful. John Madden explained Turducken better than he analyzed how the Patriots won.

The Patriots didn't fit into any of the football cliches they used as crutches, and this confused many of the pundits, even made them look foolish.

This is part of the reason everyone was so quick to latch on once Spygate broke in 2007. Finally, their success could be summed up in a neat little package.

They cheated.

The narrative follows the franchise a decade later. It's been around so long it's had time to take several different twists and turns. First it was the coach, then the quarterback, then the culture. Now, the league is in on it, giving the Patriots every call, every break.

Patriots fans are rightly sick of hearing about it but need to accept the fact that it is never going away, no matter how many facts they try to introduce into the dialogue. And it comes down to this - far too many of them are still desperately want their team to be loved. More Patriots fans need to come

over to the dark side and embrace the hate. Agree with the Patriots' detractors. Coax them into devising more conspiracy theories.

I'm doing my part, spreading rumors at every opportunity.

Gronk's concussion test this week? Ernie Adams took it for him. And the league knows

Brady's hand? It wasn't a cut. He's had his real hand replaced with a bionic one that can take a snap, deflate the ball and throw it dur-


ing every play. Bill Belichick tricked the Steelers into releasing James Harrison. I mean, nobody be-

key grip for the TB12 documentary. And, by the way, that is NOT Danny Amen-


Eat your heart out, Seth Wickersham. And revel in the hate, Patriots fans. Your team is living rent free in America's collective brain, and it is glorious.
