HONEYMOON IDEAS FOR THE TRIP OF A LIFETIME

INSIDERS' GUIDE TO THE GLOBE

THE TRAVELER CHIARA FERRAGNI @theblondesalad THE DESTINATION PUGLIA, ITALY All golden beaches, soaring cliffs, and baroque architecture, this still-unspoiled region on Italy's sun-drenched heel is where Ferragni spent much of last summer. "It's one of the most beautiful places, with amazing scenery, nature, and ancient history," she says. WHERE TO STAY Puglia is known for its masserias, fortified country houses with working farms. Ferragni's fave? Masseria Torre Coccaro (from \$309; masseriatorrecoccaro.com), a 36-room retreat with one of the prettiest beaches in Italy and olive groves that are over 800 years old. WHERE TO EAT Once used by 17th-century nobility as a banquet hall, the candlelit Ristorante Grotta Palazzese is carved into a limestone cave and has views of the Adriatic Sea. "It's extremely romantic, and the food is delicious!" Think grilled octopus and zucchini blossoms stuffed with cheese and fresh Italian herbs. WHAT TO DO Spend a day getting lost in the winding cobble-stone streets of Ostuni, a.k.a. the White City, famous for its white-washed buildings with bright green or blue doors. Or post up at the hotel and book horseback riding, a seaside wine tasting at sunset, or a cooking class with ingredients picked fresh from the garden. "I learned to make orecchiette here," says Ferragni.

Take a cooking class together!

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THE TRAVELER PAM ALLIER @pamallier THE DESTINATION PARIS Allier finds herself in the City of Light twice a year but prefers it when there's a chill in the air. "The cold months make me fall in love with the city," she says. "It's the hot cocoa and the smell of chestnuts." **WHERE TO STAY** "I've been to a lot of amazing hotels, but the time my husband, Pablo, and I rented an apartment for a week is when I really felt Parisian," she says. Try Paris Perfect


(studios from \$131; parisperfect.com), a full-service vacation-rental agency that can hook you up with a pied-à-terre for less than the cost of many hotel rooms. For a fee, the company will even stock your fridge or arrange for a private Pilates lesson on your balcony. WHERE TO EAT "I dream about the French toast at Marcel, a café in the Seventh Arrondissement. It's served with salted butter, toffee sauce, and bananas." Another standout: the eggs Benedict. WHAT TO DO Take a cue from the fashion blogger's favorite activity, "walking the city with no plans at all." Stroll along the Seine from the Île Saint-Louis to the Passerelle Debilly bridge, which has the best Eiffel Tower views.

THE DESTINATION ASPEN, COLORADO

"I love visiting Aspen. It's a short flight from Los Angeles and feels like a winter wonderland," says Hewitt, who fell for the mountain town during a trip to the World SnowPolo championship in 2015. But Aspen isn't just for cold-weather honeymooners: "The spring and summer are beautiful for hiking and outdoor activities too." WHERE TO STAY A Gilded Age manor disguised as a ski resort, the St. Regis Aspen (from \$299; stregis.com) spoils couples with OTT amenities like an altitude concierge who will prebook oxygen-infused spa treatments and a



session on the hotel's state-of-the-art oxygen machine (to curb altitude sickness). Plus, the location is amazing: "It's close to the ski lifts and a few blocks from the shops on Main Street." **WHERE TO EAT** Aspen is famous for its restaurants—and its bar scene. "Be sure to après-ski at the Little Nell or the Sky Hotel," says Hewitt. For dinner, she favors the sushi at Matsuhisa and Kenichi. "After, stay warm with drinks at Caribou Club or Bootsy Bellows." **WHAT TO DO** Filled with high-end designer boutiques and trendy stores like Intermix, Aspen is a shopper's heaven. "But if you want something really special, my boy-friend and I stumbled upon Kemo Sabe, where they make custom-fit cowboy hats."





THE TRAVELER ZIM UGOCHUKWU @travelnoire

THE DESTINATION CAPE TOWN, SOUTH AFRICA

The 28-year-old has been traveling the world since she was two, but South Africa is a place she keeps coming back to. "I'm considering moving there in a few years," she says. For newlyweds, it's all about Cape Town, the laid-back city on Africa's southernmost tip, known for its surfing beaches and stunning vineyards. WHERE TO STAY Ugochukwu often rents an Airbnb, but you can also try the landmark Belmond Mount Nelson Hotel (from \$473; belmond .com), a sugar-pink retreat celebs-and hosted that's even Nelson Mandela. For maximum romance, book one of the garden cottage suites; each is surrounded by a white picket fence and fronted by its very own rose garden. WHERE TO EAT "Marcos African Place is a favorite of mine," she says. "It's one of the few blackowned restaurants in Cape Town." On the menu? Springbok, crocodile, impala, and home-brewed African beer. If you're exploring the winelands, Ugochukwu favors the terroirfocused cuisine at Tokara, on an estate in Stellenbosch: "The setting is like something out of a movie." WHAT TO DO As gorgeous as Cape Town looks at street level, the city is even more stunning from up above. "The hike up Table Mountain is spectacular. And a helicopter ride around the coast is a must."

MÉRIDA, MEXICO



Have the bartender mix up a Salty Chihuahua, made with tequila, lemonade, and an optional splash of soda.

This Dutch fashionista and Gisou-hair-care founder raves about the Yucatán Peninsula. "I traveled there last year with my boyfriend, Maurits, and it was an unforgettable experience," she says. "The capital, Mérida, is a 16th-century colonial city filled with history, friendly people, and amazing food." **WHERE TO STAY** "I love boutique hotels, so we stayed at Rosas & Xocolate." (Translation: roses and chocolate. *From \$245; rosasandxocolate.com.*) The 17-room hotel-set in two restored century-old mansions on the Paseo de

Montejo-is petal pink on the outside and filled with handcrafted details and themed amenities on the inside, like chocolate soap in the suites, chocolate treatments in the spa, and a chocolate boutique downstairs. **WHERE TO EAT** "We ate lots of chilaquiles and guacamole. I definitely filled my avocado quota," says Mirsalehi. "The food is such high quality, but it's also affordable, so you don't have to break the bank to have an authentic meal." For traditional Yucatecan eats, head to La Chaya Maya for cochinita pibil, pork marinated with achiote and sour orange juice and cooked in a banana leaf. **WHAT TO DO** Mirsalehi spent much of her time visiting haciendas, the region's beautiful old plantation houses. But if you're around on a Saturday, head to Mercado Lucas de Gálvez to pick up woven baskets and hand-stitched huipiles (traditional Mayan dresses).
