→ What is Jargon?

Applied contemptuously to any mode of speech abounding in unfamiliar terms, or peculiar to a particular set of persons, as the language of scholars or philosophers, the terminology of a science or art, or the cant of a class, sect, trade, or profession.

Simply, speech of a profession or specialized hobby.

→ What is Lingo?

A contemptuous designation for: Foreign speech or language; language which is strange or unintelligible to the person who so designates it; language peculiar to some special subject, or employed (whether properly or affectedly) by some particular class of persons.



Doctor Jargon

Intravenously- in the vein

Teacher Jargon

 Withitness- teachers must be aware of what is going on in the classroom



Lawyer jargon/lingo

- Objection- the lawyer has an issue with the previous action
- Sustained- the objection is approved
- Overruled- the objection is denied

→ What is dialect?

Manner of speaking, language, speech; esp. a manner of speech peculiar to, or characteristic of, a particular person or class; phraseology, idiom.

Simplified: Speech unique to a certain part of the country or group of people

Examples

- Southern
- Midwest Non-Regional/Midlands
- African American Vernacular English
- North/South Boston

→ Myths of Dialect

Dialects are bad versions of English

No, dialects are just variations of English that have their own rules.

→ Myths of Dialect

If you speak in a dialect, you do not know proper grammar.

Dialects do follow grammatical rules.

→ Myths of Dialect

You are not intelligent if you do not speak in Standard English.

Standard English is not a measure of intelligence but is the universal and most understood form of English for business and other formal uses.

→ Definition

Language of a highly colloquial type, considered as below the level of standard educated speech, and consisting either of new words or of current words employed in some special sense.

or... speech for the streets.

Examples

- 1. Cheddar
 - a. Slang: Money
 - b. Real: Cheese
- 2. Phat
 - a. Cool; Pretty, Hot, and Tempting
- 3. Church
 - a. Slang: Sign of agreement; good bye
 - b. Real: A place of worship
- 4. "pwned"
 - a. Gaming term "Perfect Ownage"
 - b. To be better than or defeat

→ 1337Speak

1337Speak or Leet Speak is a gaming language using alternating letters or numbers as a code to communicate with other gamers

Was designed to confuse "nubes" or N00bs (new players) from understanding experienced players.

→ From Slang to Standard

- Through heavy popular use
- Words are added to the dictionary and allowed for use.
