On Monday, 1 June, members from both companies of the Governor's Foot Guard along with members of the Governor's Horse Guard made their annual road trip to Boston for the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company's June Day celebration.

Every first Monday of June, the AHAC of Massachusetts celebrates the election of their new officers with a march through the streets of Boston, a battalion parade of historical militia units in Boston Common, and a memorial necrology service.

Preceding the step-off of the parade, lunch was provided by

the AHAC in their Faneuil Hall meeting room and museum. With the AHAC taking the lead, all the militia units of the Centennial Legion stepped off Congress Street at 13:00 and marched directly toward Boston Common. Newly elected Major Commandant Mark Boudreau led the 1st Company GFG officers, Color Guard, and drumline.

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Arriving at the Common, all militia units assembled for the "Drum Head Election", a recreation of the AHAC's first election of officers highlighted by a ceremonial exchange of spontoons between sergeants and accompanied by deafening salutes from the Massachusetts National Guard's howitzers.

The Honorable Charlie Baker, Govenor of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, addressed the entire formation praising the AHAC for their efforts in keeping alive the military history of Massachusetts and thanking them for the pride they bring to the State. After a Pass and Review before the AHAC Command officers, the entire formation marched out of the Common to Copley Square where the members of the AHAC promptly entered historic Trinity Church for their memorial service.

Once dismissed, members of all units returned to the Westin Hotel and changed into either formal Dress Blues or Dress Mess jackets for the AHAC's lavish evening banquette. The dinner was, as usual, spectacular and punctuated throughout the evening by several formal toasts and speeches

Spotlight On PFC Carolyn Lang

Carolyn is one of the most positive individuals I have interviewed over the last twenty years. While she respects the historical past, her focus is on moving forward. Since you can't repeat history, you can only build on it, and that is what Carolyn wants to do.

Born in Concord, Vermont, the family lived across the line in Dalton, NH. When she was ten years old the family moved to Enfield, Connecticut. With an older brother and an older sister, she was the baby of the family. Carolyn attended public schools, and graduated from Enfield High School in 1971. She went on to work at Aetna as an engineering training and education specialist, Carolyn met her husband Michael Lally. They have four children; twin daughters Karyn and Barbara, daughter Aimee, and son Christopher. The couple also has nine grandchildren.

BR: How did you get interested in the Foot guard?

Carolyn: It was at the 2013 Big E Connecticut Day parade that I first saw the Foot Guard in action. My husband and I are friends with Fred and Lori Macsata and went to Connecticut day to support Fred. I was impressed by the marchers, the band, the



uniforms, and by the fact that they had women members. Being a member of the former Enfield Sabers Drum and Bugle Corp, I felt the Foot Guard would give me an opportunity to march again. While I didn't know much about the Foot Guard, and had never been a soldier, I felt that joining would allow me the opportunity to honor soldiers, the state and this nation. I have really enjoyed being able to honor my Father, Calvin Lang. He was a Navy man, serving on the USS Ticonderoga during the Second World War. I will never forget the time I was allowed to carry the US Navy flag at a color guard detail. I was incredibly moved and just knew that my Dad would be so proud.

BR: As a new Foot Guarder, why did you get involved with the Christmas Party?

Carolyn: I got involved in the Christmas party simply because I was asked by Rich Gatewood to help him out. The idea to give children's toys instead of grab bag gifts for ourselves came to me because of my love of community outreach. We were able to bring several bags of toys to Gary Craig at WTIC and actually got some great airtime in the process. A win win situation!!

Through my church and the Women's Bible Study group that I led for ten years I had many opportunities to do outreach projects from raising funds for "Alex's Lemonade Stand", an organization that works to find a cure for childhood cancers, to "Hope for Haiti" sewing baptismal gowns and raising funds to send to this extremely poor country. (Haiti is the second poorest country in the Western Hemisphere). When the opportunity came to do relief work in Haiti after the devastating earthquake of 2010, I was able to go there for two weeks to bring food, medicine, clothing and hope to the devastated families in Carrefour, Haiti. I was the ground coordinator for my team's trip and had the responsibility of food purchases in the

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Dominican Republic, and getting it, our 98 bags of supplies, and four relief workers over the border and into Haiti.

BR: How can the Company improve itself?

Carolyn: Through our activities. For example, when I serve on the color guard, we are representing not only the first Company, but the State and the Nation as well. We let the community see that we are a service organization, as well as a military organization. That's why I participate in parades, and the color guard details. All of these activities give us community visibility. One thing I think we should be doing, is getting involved with the local schools. We present academic scholarships to the three Hartford high schools, and to the UConn School of Agriculture. The band also does some joint concerts with selected school children which I think this is fantastic!! I would like to see us do more with school children. These kids will be our future Foot Guarders. I would love to invite the public to see the museum that has been put together here at the Armory.

BR: What do you like most about the Foot Guard?

Carolyn: The marching. And also the fact that I feel accepted and protected by the other members of the Command.

BR: And what do you like the least?

Carolyn: Tensions over the events of the past. I think we should spend more time planning for the future, and not ruminating over the events which have shaped our present existence.

BR: Where do you see the Command ten years down the road?

Carolyn: Hopefully, we will be still here and much larger. We have such a rich history to focus on and not the events of the immediate past.

BR: Where do you see yourself in ten years? **Carolyn:** Still here, and hopefully promoted (laughs).

BR: If you could do it over again, what would you do differently?

Carolyn: Although I have a general philosophy that "you are right where you are supposed to be" I do wish that I had joined at a younger age. I have worked hard, raised my kids, owned and operated both a sports bar (The Penalty Box Cafe) and an Irish pub and restaurant (Durty McDuff's Public House) with my husband, and learned in that process, that about ninety-nine percent of the people you meet are good people. I believe that is a good lesson to learn and to live by.

BR: What's you connection to (Past Major Commandant) Bob Burnham and his Family?

Carolyn: During our years of Bar and Restaurant ownership, Major Burnham's sons Bobby and Tom were regulars. I believe Tommy met his wife Joan at The Penalty Box Cafe. Tom just told me at the last medals ceremony that his son wore one of our old Penalty Box T-shirts at his graduation party. Sweet memories......

BR: Do you have anyone you would call a mentor? **Carolyn:** I would like to thank Fred Macsata for his constant encouragement. Rich Gatewood, Roger





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Conley, Chris Cain and John Green always made a point to stop by the EMC to say hello when I sat there week after week waiting for my paperwork to go through. Mark Boudreau, as assistant color Sergeant, always made sure that I was aware of upcoming details and was sure to make me feel like I was an important member of all details. I would like to suggest, however, that a formal support system be set up for each new recruit, with a mentor actually assigned. This might help us retain more of our new recruits.

BR: Anything else?

Carolyn: It is a real privilege to be able to serve the State of Connecticut in the capacity of membership in this very important Historical Unit. I hope to leave a footprint of pride and accomplishment here after I am gone.



Captain Pratt was born in Hartford, on March 17, 1838 on a farm on upper Windsor Avenue. After two years of high school life, his health failed. He then went to Louisiana, where he regained his health

completely. He served in the Civil War in the Confederate Army, and was taken prisoner in 1863. He remained in prison until March 1864, when he was paroled for one year, to be spent in Connecticut, reporting to the provost sergeant once a month.

He enlisted in the Foot Guard, on October 21, 1867. He served in every office in the command, except that of orderly sergeant, which he skipped to become captain and first lieutenant. He was honorably discharged as captain in 1891. He re-enlisted at once, and had to sign his application and go before the membership committee just like any new recruit. He was appointed corporal a second time in January, 1898, and, after forty-seven years in active service, was a sergeant.


In Memoriam
