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#### SECOND OR SUBSEQUENT REFERENCES

When a work has already been cited in complete form, later references to it are made in shortened form. The abbreviation "ibid." is used to repeat references which follow one another without any intervening reference, even when several pages may separate the references.

When there are intervening references a shortened form is used. When there is only one work by an author, the following form is used:

FOOTNOTE <sup>9</sup> Comer, 97.

When more than one book by an author is cited the following form is used:

FOOTNOTE <sup>10</sup> Comer, *Internet*, 109.
