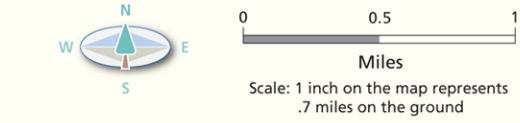

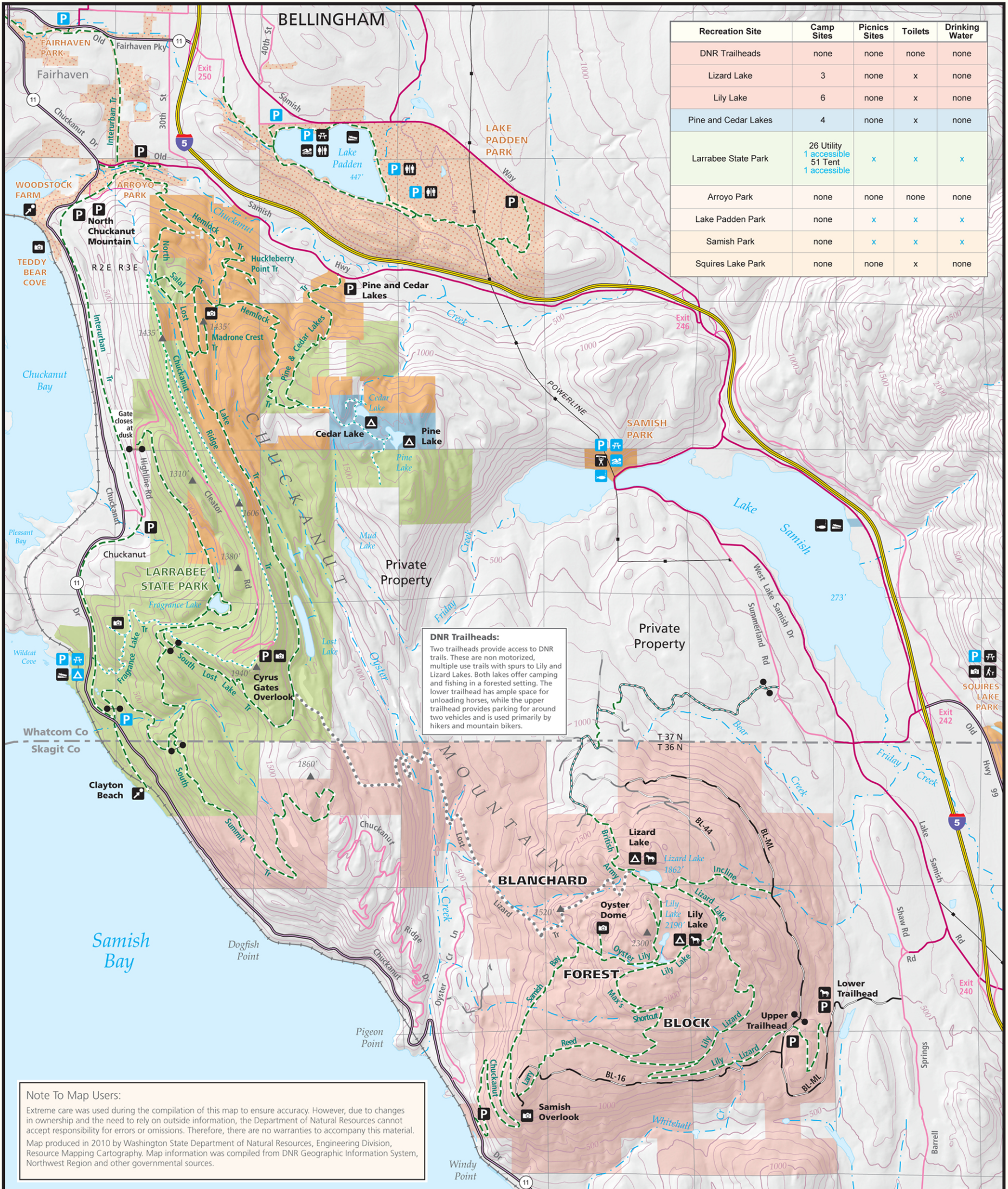
Contour Interval = 100 Feet.

On the Trails and In the Campsites:

- Practice "leave no trace" ethics:
 - Do not alter or remove vegetation.
 - Stay on maintained trails; please don't cut switchbacks.
 - Pack out garbage and litter.
- Pets must be leashed.
- Respect the rights of others on trails.
- Watch for hazardous trail conditions.
- Camp in designated campsites only.
- Limit fires to steel campsites fireplaces.
- Maintain quiet in campsites between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m.
- Secure food supplies. Protect wildlife from human food sources.

Please Note:

Blanchard is a working forest. Management activities may temporarily limit recreational uses.



DNR Trailheads:
Two trailheads provide access to DNR trails. These are non motorized, multiple use trails with spurs to Lily and Lizard Lakes. Both lakes offer camping and fishing in a forested setting. The lower trailhead has ample space for unloading horses, while the upper trailhead provides parking for around two vehicles and is used primarily by hikers and mountain bikers.
