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What does college and career ready mean in elementary school?

<u>College Ready:</u> A college ready student is an academically prepared student, ready for post-secondary education or training without the need for remedial coursework. Whether you are pursuing a four-year degree or studying for a skilled trade license being ready means having the reading, writing, mathematics, social and cognitive skills to qualify for and succeed in the academic program of your choice.
