CALENDAR.

Introductory Address, Monday evening, October 4th. Regular Winter Session begins Tuesday, October 5th. The Holiday Vacation is from December 24th to January 3d. Lectures will close, March 1st, 1881. Annual Commencement, March 1st. Spring and Summer Term will begin March 8th. The Lectures of this Term and the College Year close May 31st.

The Eleventh Annual Session of the Woman's Medical College will commence on the first Tuesday of October, 1880, at 10 A. M., and continue twenty-one weeks.

In making this Announcement, the Faculty are happy to state to the friends of the medical education of women, that the class has increased more than one hundred per cent. during the past year. This, it seems to us, is a sufficient guarantee that our method of admitting students to the College by requiring a preliminary examination is meeting with general favor, not only among those commencing the study, but among practitioners of medicine.

COLLEGE BUILDING.

The new College Building, erected three years since, is admirably adapted to our wants. It is commodious, well lighted, and well ventilated, and is supplied with every convenience for teaching. It is two and one-half stories high with a basement; containing two lecture rooms capable of seating one hundred and fifty students; laboratory, museum, dissecting room, microscopical cabinet, parlor, etc., etc. observation

COURSE OF STUDY.

For the more systematic and thorough instruction of students, the curriculum has been divided into Junior and Senior Courses.

The Junior Course embraces the following branches, viz.: Anatomy, Physiology, Chemistry, Materia Medica and Therapeutics.

The Senior Course embraces the following branches, viz.: Pathology, Practice of Medicine, Surgery, Obstetrics, Diseases of Women and Children, and Clinical instruction.

Students are advised to enter the Junior Class, devoting their time exclusively to its branches during the first session, and to those of the Senior Class during the second session, with such reviews as the Faculty may direct.

Students will in no case be permitted to discard entirely the Junior studies during the last year of their course.

Students who have attended one course of lectures in this or any other regular Medical College, may be admitted to the Senior Class, or to the lectures of both classes, subject to an examination in all the branches at the close of the session, should they present themselves for graduation.

PRACTICAL WORK.

Anatomy.—The dissecting room is large, well lighted and well ventilated, and has all the conveniences for enabling the student to prosecute the study of practical anatomy with the greatest comfort and profit. Good material is abundant and furnished at cost. The demonstrator gives his personal supervision and assistance to each student and makes frequent demonstrations of the viscera and important regions and relations.

Physiology.—The lectures upon this important branch will be supplemented with the usual vivisections and by microscopical illustrations of as many of the natural tissues as time will allow.

Chemistry.—The practical chemical work consists of tests for the most common metals and acids used in medicine and urinalysis. The chemical reactions will be required to be written out as the various substances are analyzed. This written work will be considered in part an examination. The course is eminently practical, and is a great aid to the perfect understanding of theoretical chemistry. Students who desire

to take a special course in chemical toxicology, will have an opportunity so to do.

Microscopy.-This department will receive the attention which its importance demands.

SELECT COURSES OF STUDY.

Ladies desiring a systematic and thorough knowledge of Anatomy, Physiology, Chemistry or Microscopy, to better qualify themselves for the occupation of teaching, or as part of a liberal education, but who do not wish to pursue the regular curriculum with reference to graduation, are encouraged to take advantage of the facilities this College affords. Such students will be required to matriculate (\$5) and take out a ticket (\$10) for each branch they may select.

If at any time special students decide to pursue the full course, the fees already paid will be credited on the general ticket.

FACULTY STUDENTS.

The Faculty desire to give every possible encouragement to the growing tendency toward a higher medical education. To this end they propose, so far as practicable, to assume the exclusive direction of the medical education of the students of the College. Students are accordingly advised to place themselves under the direction of the Faculty at the commencement of their studies and continue in that relation during three full years (or until their graduation). They will be enrolled as "Faculty Students," and will pursue a systematic course of study and practical work, as the Faculty may direct. They will attend three full courses of regular lectures, and the intervening courses of spring and summer instruction if practicable. After attending two full courses of winter lectures, Faculty Students will be permitted to pass their examinations in Descriptive Anatomy, Chemistry, Physiology and Materia Medica, and certificates of such examinations will be issued. It is not intended, however, that these four branches shall be The final examination will embrace Regional entirely dismissed. Anatomy, Pharmacy, Urinalysis, Physiology of the Nervous System and the branches of the Senior course. At their graduation, Faculty Students will receive, in addition to the usual diploma, a special certi-

ficate of honor, signed by the members of the Faculty and their assistants, for which no extra charge will be made.

CLINICAL ADVANTAGES.

COOK COUNTY HOSPITAL.

The Cook County General Hospital is situated directly opposite the College. This Hospital, which has recently been erected, is one of the largest and best equipped in the country. The clinical amphitheatre, with a seating capacity of six hundred, is open to all students. Six clinical lectures are delivered every week, embracing the following subjects: Surgery, Practical Medicine, Gynecology, Ophthalmology and Otology. On almost every clinical day important surgical operations are performed.

CENTRAL FREE DISPENSARY.

This institution is located within a single block of the College. About eight thousand patients received treatment at this Dispensary during the past year. As these patients are classified according to their diseases, excellent opportunities are offered for the study of specialties. All students are gratuitously admitted to its advantages. The institution is provided with an amplitheatre, in which clinical lectures are given daily on Gynecology, Diseases of the Chest, Surgery, Dermatology, Diseases of Children, Practical Medicine, and Operative Dentistry.

HOSPITAL FOR WOMEN AND CHILDREN.

Clinical lectures will be delivered daily by the staff of this Hospital, to which the students will be admitted as heretofore. The staff of this Hospital will also select from our graduating class, by competitive examination, two *internes*, who will serve for one year.

THE WOMAN'S HOSPITAL

Of the State of Illinois selects from our graduating class one *interne* for service in that hospital.

ST. JOSEPH'S HOSPITAL.

Prof. Brower will give clinics on Mental and Nervous Diseases at St. Joseph's Hospital, and Cook County Hospital for the Insane.

ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL.

Prof. Owens will give surgical clinics at this institution.

ILLINOIS CHARITABLE EYE AND EAR INFIRMARY.

This institution is located near the College, and affords an excellent opportunity for studying the diagnosis and treatment of ophthalmic and aural diseases. Clinical lectures are given by Profs. Holmes and Jones, and Dr. Hotz, three times a week.

COLLEGE CLINICS.

These clinics have been largely attended, and are of the greatest advantage to our class, for whose benefit, exclusively, they were established. They are conducted weekly by Prof. Fitch, on Diseases of Women; Prof. Owen, on Surgery; Prof. Montgomery, on Diseases of the Eye and Ear; Prof. Maynard, on Diseases of the Skin; Prof. Ingals, on Diseases of the Chest.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION.

Students will not be admitted to the College unless they can give satisfactory proof of a good English education.

Certificates of graduation from a High School, or like institution, or a teacher's certificate from a County Superintendent of Schools, will be accepted as sufficient evidence of such education.

Students presenting themselves for admission without such credentials will in every case be required to pass an examination before a committee of the Faculty.

The Faculty reserve the right to terminate the connection of any student with the institution at any time during the course, on the ground of what they may deem moral or mental unfitness for the profession.

Certificates of character will hereafter be required at the time of matriculation.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION.

Every candidate for graduation will be required to show: 1st. That she has studied medicine three full years under the direc-

tion of a regular physician, or the Faculty, and attended two full courses of lectures, one of which has been in this Institution.

2d. That she has dissected each of the usual divisions of the subject, at least once, and has attended a full course of Clinical Instruction.

3d. That she has taken a course of laboratory work in practical chemistry.

4th. That she is 21 years.

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5th. That she has passed a satisfactory examination by the Faculty.

6th. That she has prepared and submitted to the Faculty a Thesis upon some topic connected with medical science.

One month before the annual commencement, each applicant for graduation shall deposit with the Treasurer of the Faculty the examination fee, which is not returnable.

Any student having attended and paid for two courses of lectures in this College, will be admitted free to any subsequent course, upon the payment of the matriculation fee.

The matriculation fee (\$5.00) and the sum of \$10.00 will be charged for this course, which amount will be deducted from the fees for the next lecture term.

DIRECTIONS FOR STUDENTS.

Students will matriculate at the office of the Secretary, and obtain a General Ticket of the Treasurer, which will admit them to all the lectures of the course. At the close of the session, each Professor will furnish certificates for time of attendance.

Good board and rooms, convenient to the College, can be obtained for \$3.50 to \$6.00 per week.

THE ASSOCIATION OF AMERICAN MEDICAL COLLEGES.

A convention of representatives from a large number of Medical Colleges of the A convention of representatives from a large number of Medical Colleges of the United States was held June 2 and 3, 1876, in Philadelphia, The object of the con-vention was to consider all matters relating to reform in Medical College work. The call was officially signed by six Medical Colleges, and responded to by more than twenty at the first meeting. Important questions were considered, a provi-sional association formed, and a committee to draft a constitution and by-laws for a permanent organization appointed.

The Provisional Association met in Chicago, June 2 and 4, 1877, a permanent organization was formed under the above title, and a Constitution, By-Laws and Articles of Confederation adopted. The second annual meeting was held at Buffalo, 1878; the third at Atlanta, 1879, and the fourth in New York, 1880.

ARTICLES OF CONFEDERATION.

[To be subscribed and conformed to by all the Colleges of the Confederation.]

ARTICLE I. OF THE FACULTY.

The medical members of the Faculty must be regular graduates or licentiates and practitioners of medicine, in good standing, using the word "regular" in the sense commonly understood in the medical profession.

ARTICLE II. OF TUITION.

SECTION 1. The scheme of tuition shall provide for a yearly systematic course of instruction covering the general topics of Anatomy, including dissections, Physiology, Chemistry, Materia Medica and Therapeutics, Obstetrics, Surgery, Pathology and Practice of Medicine. The collegiate session, wherein this course is given, shall be understood as the "regular" session. SEC. 2. Said regular session shall not be less than twenty weeks in duration.

This section to go in force at and after the session of 1879-80.

Sec. 3. Not more than one regular session, counting the regular session as one of the two courses of instruction required for graduation, shall be held in the same year.

ARTICLE III. REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION.

No person, whether a graduate in medicine or not, shall be given a Diploma of "Doctor of Medicine" who shall not have fulfilled the following requirements, except as hereinafter provided for in Article IV.: 1. He must produce satisfactory evidence of good moral character, and of hav-

ing attained the age of twenty-one years.

2. He must file a satisfactory certificate of having studied medicine for at least three years under a regular graduate, or licentiate and practitioner of medicine, in good standing, using the word "regular" in the sense commonly understood in the medical profession. No candidate shall be eligible for final examination for graduation, unless his term of three years' study shall have been completed, or shall expire at a date not later than three months after the close of the final examinations: this clause to take effect at and after the session of 1879-80.

3. He must file the proper official evidence that, during the above mentioned three years, he has matriculated at some affiliated college or colleges, for two regular sessions, and in the course of the same (except as provided in 4) has attended two full courses of instruction on the seven topics mentioned in Article II. But the latter, at least, of the two full courses must have been attended at the college issuing the diploma. No two consecutive courses of instruction shall be held as satisfying the above requirements unless the time between the beginning of the first course and the end of the second is greater than fifteen months.

4. In case a college shall adopt a systematic graduated scheme of tuition, at-tendance on the whole of the same shall be equivalent to the requirements menin a structure of the state state state of the state state of the requirements methods in Article IL, and requires attendance of at least two yearly regular collegiate sessions of not less than twenty weeks' duration each. 5. The candidate must have passed a personal examination before the Faculty on all seven of the branches of medicince mentioned in Article IL.

6. He must have paid in full all College dues, including the graduation fee.

ARTICLE IV. OF HONORARY DEGREES.

An honorary degree of "Doctor in Medicine" may be granted in numbers not exceeding one yearly, to distinguished physicians or scientific men of over forty years of age. But in such case the diploma shall bear across its face the word "Honorary," in conspicuous characters, and the same word shall always be appended to the name of the recipient in all lists of graduates.

ARTICLE V. OF FEES.

SECTION 1. All fees shall be paid in lawful money, and no promissory notes or promises to pay shall be accepted in lieu of cash for payment of fees. SEC. 2. No ticket or other certificate of attendance upon college exercises shall be issued to any student until the dues for the same shall be paid.

SEC. 3. The established fees for the exercises of the regular session, except the matriculation fee, graduation fee, fee for dissection, may be reduced not more than one-half to graduates of other affiliated colleges of less than three years' standing, and to undergraduates of the same who have already attended two full courses of the instruction of the regular session.

SEC. 4. The same fees may be remitted altogether to college's own alumni, to graduates of other affiliated colleges of three years' standing-the three years dating from the time of graduation, and ending at the close of the regular session for which the tickets are given-to undergraduates who have already attended two full courses of the instruction of the regular session, the latter of which, at least, shall have been in the college making the remission, and to theological students, when not candidates for a diploma.

SEC. 5. The same fees may be reduced or remitted to deserving indigent students to a number not exceeding five per cent. of the number of matriculants at the previous regular session of the college.

SEC, 6. Under no circumstances whatever, other than the above, shall the Faculties, or any member of the same, grant, *upon their own authority*, any remission or reduction of established fees. And it is distinctly understood and agreed that the Faculties will discountenance and oppose the authorizing by governing boards of the admission of individual students upon other than the regularly established charges for their grade.

SEC. 7. Remission or reduction of fees for other exercises than those of the regular session, return to a student of any moneys after payment of fees, or an appropriation of funds of the College for payment of any student's fees, or part thereof, shall be deemed violation of the provisions of this Article in regard to remission or reduction of fees.

ARTICLE VI. OF RECOGNITION OF OTHER COLLEGES.

No College shall admit to the privileges accorded in Articles III. and V. the students or graduates of any College which, during any period of the student's or graduate's pupilage, shall have been excluded from the list of affiliated Colleges recognized by the Association.

ARTICLE VII. AMENDMENTS.

Amendments to these Articles shall be proposed and adopted in the manner prescribed for amendments to the Constitution.
