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Writing Sentences → Improving Sentence Structure Level: Middle School

An independent clause is a complete sentence with a subject and a verb. It is possible to connect two independent clauses in a sentence by using a comma <u>and</u> a conjunction. But watch out! Using a comma alone is known as a **comma splice**, and it is incorrect. Another common error is to run two independent clauses together without a comma or a conjunction. This is called a **fused structure (or a run-on)**.

Read each example below. All of the sentences contain two independent clauses. Some are joined correctly, but others are fused or have a comma splice. Rewrite the incorrect sentences by joining the independent clauses correctly or by separating them into two sentences. Place a check mark next to the sentence if it is correct.
