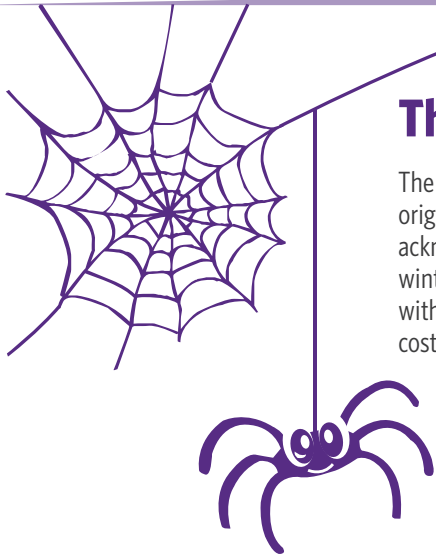


Fun Facts: Halloween – October 31



The Evolution of Halloween

The annual holiday that is celebrated each year on October 31st originated with the Celtic festival of Samhain; a Gaelic festival acknowledging the end of the harvest season and the beginning of winter. Today, the tradition has evolved into a day (and night) filled with activities such as trick-or-treating, carving pumpkins, wearing costumes, and social celebrations.

- **Over 45,000:** The number of people employed by U.S. manufacturing businesses that produced chocolate and cocoa products in 2017.
- **Nearly 24,000:** The number of people employed by U.S. manufacturing businesses that produced nonchocolate candy in 2017.
