As our student population grows, so do our educational programs for associate degrees, basic skills, career education, transfer preparation, and noncredit and distance education. Across our campuses and sites, we now offer more than 1,250 excellent courses and 100-plus degrees and certificates.

In 2017, we graduated the largest class in College of the Desert's history, awarding more than 1,200 degrees and certificates. I look forward to seeing each of you walk across the stage to receive your degree and join the ranks of our proud Roadrunner Alumni.

REFUND POLICY

Refund deadlines vary for classes during each term. To qualify for a refund, a student must officially withdraw from the class by the Refund Deadline date on page 1.

Refunds, less a \$10.00 processing fee, will be processed automatically beginning March 5th and will either be mailed to the student's address on file with Admissions and Records, or returned as a credit to the credit card from which fees were originally paid. See Refund Policy in the Course Catalog for more information. Refunds of less than \$10 will not be processed and must be requested in person from the Bursar's Office.

REFUND DEADLINES:

Pursuant to Section 58508 of Subchapter 6 of Chapter 9 or Division 6, Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations, a community college district shall not refund any enrollment fee or differential enrollment fee paid by a student for program changes made after the first two weeks of instruction for a primary term-length course, or after the 10 percent point of the length of the course for a short-term course, unless the program change is a result of action by the district to cancel or reschedule a class or to drop a student pursuant to Section 58106 (g) where the student fails to meet a prerequisite or fails to drop by the deadline.

RETURNED CHECK SERVICE CHARGE

Checks returned for non-sufficient funds or "Stop Payments" will be charged a \$25.00 service fee. There will be a hold put on your records and your enrollment at College of the Desert, and your credit may be affected.

Enrollment Fee Deadline for Spring 2018

- To avoid being dropped from classes for non-payment, students must pay within three (3) days of registration for the Spring 2018 term. Count the day you enroll as the first day to prevent being dropped for non-payment.
- Students registering on or after January 29, must pay enrollment fees prior to the last day to drop a course. A financial hold will be placed on all student records that have an outstanding balance for the term that will prevent subsequent registration until paid.
- Drops for non-payment will not be processed once courses begin. Drops for non-payment will not be processed once the term begins.
- Students enrolled in courses they do not attend are responsible for enrollment fees and final grades if not dropped by applicable course deadline. If you have been awarded financial aid, you will not be dropped for non-payment.
- Petitions to drop past the deadline, or for refunds of courses not dropped by the deadline, will not be accepted if student fails to drop a course by the deadline.

Payment Plan Option

College of the Desert offers an optional payment plan to assist with the payment of enrollment fees. Please note there is a \$20 administrative processing fee per semester for this service. SECT/SYNONYM (in WebAdvisor) - SECTION NUMBER: Every class is identified by a 4-digit section number. This number is critical to correctly register in the section you have selected.

COURSE - COURSE CODE: The course code identifies the department and course level.

TITLE - COURSE TITLE: The course title is the descriptive name of the course.

U - UNITS: This is the number of credit units that will be earned by successfully completing the course.

SHORT-TERM CLASSES - Short-term classes are noted throughout the schedule with starting (First Meeting:) and ending dates (Last Meeting:) listed under the class title in **bold print**. Registration deadline dates for these classes will differ from the published deadlines for full-term classes.

CROSS-LISTED or EQUIVALENT SECTIONS - One or more like courses scheduled at the same time. Enrollments of all cross-listed courses are considered by the registration system, possibly showing "course is filled" when it seems there are available seats.

TBA TIME - If hours are shown as 2.3 HOURS TBA, then 2 hours and 5 minutes weekly are required (usually lab) and are TO BE ARRANGED by the student during the time the appropriate lab facility is open.

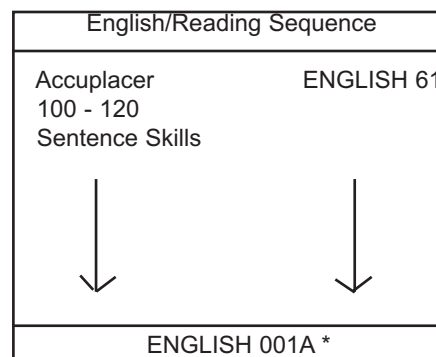
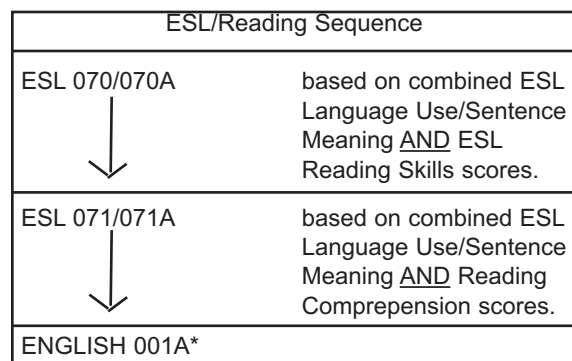
INTEGRATED ESL COMPOSITION AND READING COURSES

Integrated ESL COMPOSITION/READING = ESL 070, 071

Integrated ESL courses combine Composition and Reading curriculum into one course, allowing students to meet these requirements simultaneously.

Students who test into different levels of Composition and Reading (for example ESL 070 for Composition and ESL 071 for Reading) should see a counselor or the Dean of the School of Communication and Humanities for ESL advisement if they are interested in taking an Integrated Course.

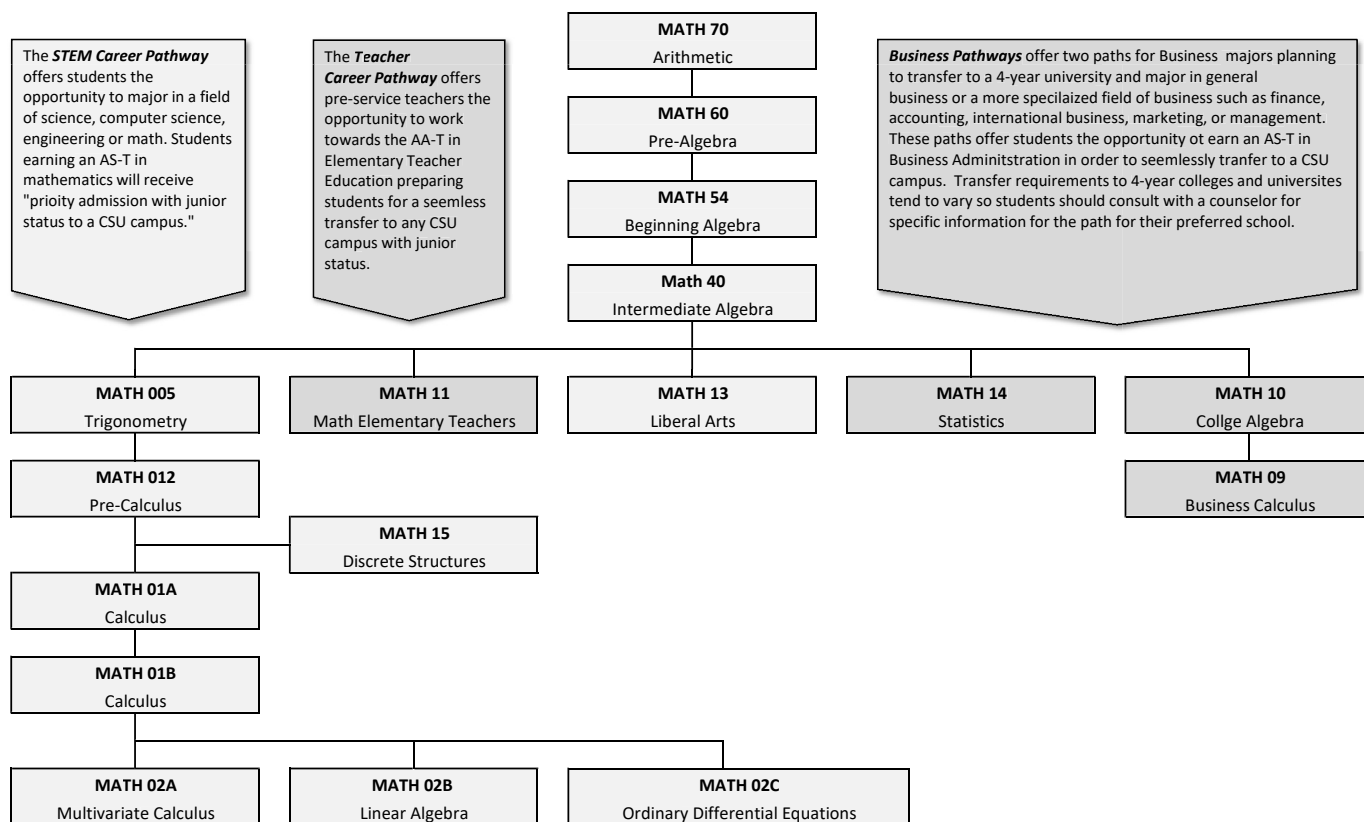

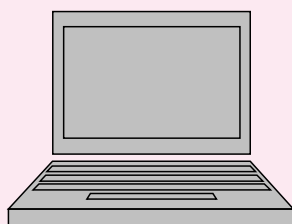

Accounting

The Bureau of Labor Statistics projects that 166,700 new accounting and auditing jobs will open up by 2022. This means the demand for well-educated accounting professionals will increase over 13 percent between now and then. Organizations large to small, domestic or global require financial guidance from professionals with accounting knowledge who can prepare, analyze, verify, and communicate financial information.

Most students don't realize the variety of accounting jobs the profession has to offer. Whereas, Forensic Accountants merge accounting with investigative legal work, Public Accountants are tasked with accounting, auditing, taxes, and consulting, Management Accountants work with decision makers within a company, and Non-Profit/Government Accountants are employed by various public agencies.

At College of the Desert students interested in pursuing a career in accounting can earn either a Certificate of Achievement in Accounting, an A.S. degree in accounting for employment preparation, or both, providing students with the skills necessary for employment or advancement in the accounting profession.

Additionally, students can earn a Bachelor's Degree without ever leaving the desert! Just complete the transfer AA Business Degree at COD and then finish the upper division accounting program at the Palm Desert campus of CSUSB.

**BI 007: Biology of Mammals and
BI 007L: Biology of Mammals, Lab**

The characteristics of mammals is briefly covered in Biology (BI 004) and Biology of Organisms (BI 006). Biology of Mammals (BI 007) covers all the major orders of mammals in depth as well as their anatomy and physiology, ecology, evolution, distribution, domestication, and conservation.

The lecture and lab are designed to fulfill the natural science elective (same as BI 004) and have been accepted for transfer to the UC's and Cal State's (lab is still pending), as well as IGETC. This is the only biology course offered in the science department in which the lecture and lab are two separate courses so that if students need only one or the other, they can be accommodated.

In addition to a natural science elective, these courses can also be taken by science majors who have fulfilled their biology requirements (BI 005 and BI 006) and want to take more biology while waiting to fulfill the rest of their science requirements (chemistry, math, physics, etc.).

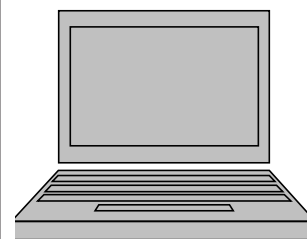

DISABLED STUDENTS PROGRAMS & SERVICES (DSPS) 773-2534

DSPS at College of the Desert is committed to providing students with documented disabilities equal access to a community college education. Through the utilization of specialized instructional programs and disability related support services, DSPS encourages and fosters independence and assists students in attaining their educational and vocational goals.

DSPS classes and instructional support workshops are offered in the High Tech Center to provide students access to adaptive hardware/software to support their academic needs.

The Learning Disabilities Program begins with the Community College Assessment of Eligibility for services. Enrollment in DSPS 301 is required for the LD Assessment. Qualified students receive specialized instruction and support services complementing and reinforcing their regular class participation.

Workability III is a jointly funded program between the State Department of Rehabilitation and California Community Colleges to assist students/clients with disabilities in job placement.

Adapted Kinesiology classes are offered during some terms for students with disabilities. Courses can include: Tennis, Yoga, Physical Activity (weight training and fitness), and Fitness Aquatics. Mobility Aides are provided for students approved for this service.

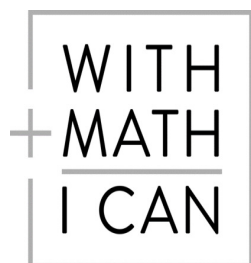

The Math 370 series are free, non-credit, self-paced math courses that offer basic mathematical literacy skills to enhance future success in credit math courses. The courses focus on addition, subtraction, multiplication and division of whole numbers, integers and fractions. For each 2 course series completed successfully, students earn a Certificate of Competency. There are 3 certificates:

- Whole Numbers Certificate of Competency
- Integers Certificate of Competency
- Rational Numbers Certificate of Competency

It is recommended that students enroll in all six of the 370 series. The advantages of these non-credit courses are:

Students that successfully earn all three certificates, can retake the Basic Skills Assessment in mathematics to potentially assess at a higher level.

Students can enroll in a course at any time during the semester and concurrently with other credit math courses.

Students can repeat any of the Math 370 courses as often as needed to develop numeracy skills.

Students can devote as much time and effort as needed in order to successfully complete each of the three certificates.

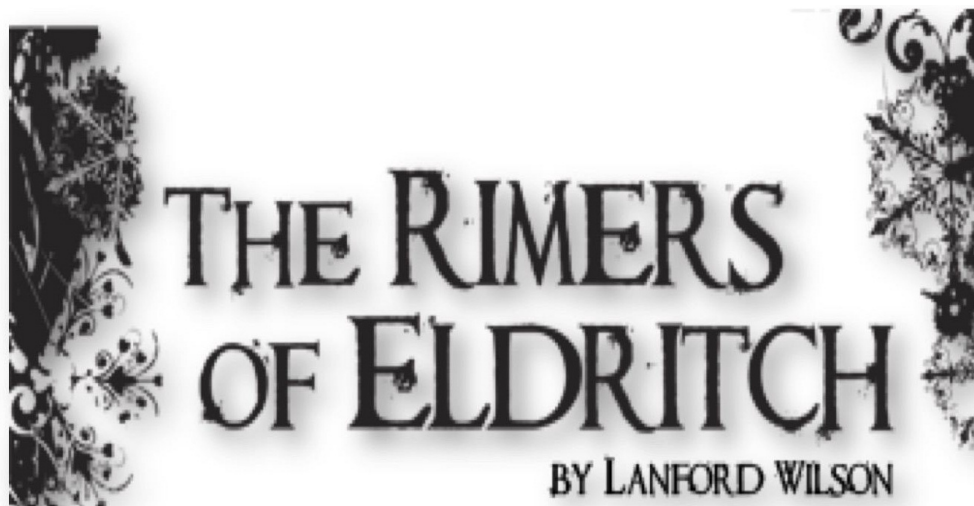

What Spanish Courses to Take

The following information will help you select the Spanish course you need to take according to your proficiency level.

Spanish as a Foreign Language Track

A student can take Spanish as a Foreign Language if he/she is a native speaker of English or another foreign language. If a student has never taken Spanish, he/she must be enrolled in SPAN 001- Elementary Spanish I (5 units). If a student has taken 1, 2, or more years of Spanish in high school or another institution, he/she may take the Spanish placement exam to determine his/her proficiency level. He/she may be placed in SPAN 002- Elementary Spanish II (5 units), SPAN 003- Intermediate Spanish I (4 units), or SPAN 004 – Intermediate Spanish II (4 units).

Spanish for Heritage Speakers Track

A student can be considered as a heritage speaker of Spanish if Spanish and English are spoken at home and/or Spanish is spoken very often. If a student can ask and answer questions orally in Spanish but he/she does not know how to read and write in Spanish, he/she must be enrolled in SPAN 021- Spanish for Heritage Speakers I (5 units). If a student can ask and answer questions orally in Spanish and have basic knowledge of how to read and write in Spanish, he/she must be enrolled in SPAN 022-Spanish for Heritage Speakers II (5 units).

Spanish Placement Test

To ensure the correct placement in a Spanish course, the Spanish Placement Exam will be given in Palm Desert at 5:00 p.m.-6:00 p.m. on Nov. 13, 20, 27, Dec. 4, Jan 23 and 30 in the Communication Building, room 113. The exam will be given in Indio at 3:00 p.m.-4:00 p.m. room 102 on Oct. 31, Nov. 9, 16, and 30. Pre-registration is not required. Be prepared to take the exam that will begin promptly on any of the dates listed above.

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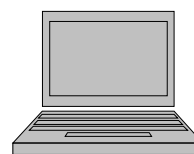

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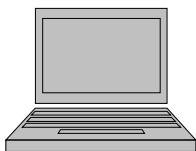

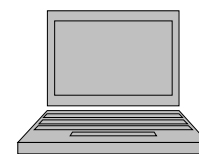

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College of the Desert's online program utilizes the Canvas learning management system software. Fully Online Course (FULLONLN)

A Fully Online Course is delivered exclusively over the Internet using Canvas. There are no class meetings on campus and all assignments and examinations are submitted online in an asynchronous manner. You must have ready access to a computer with Internet. Students enrolled in an online course should possess apt computer skills.

Proctored Online Course (PROCONLN)

All assignments and examinations in a Proctored Online Course will be submitted online in an asynchronous manner, but you will be required to take tests at a proctoring facility. Your instructor will provide proctoring accommodations at COD. Off-site proctoring services could be available at the discretion of the instructor. Contact the individual instructor to learn more about their off-site proctoring policy. You must have ready access to a computer with Internet. Hybrid Course (HYBRID)

Hybrid Courses meet both on campus and online. A portion of the traditional face-to-face on campus meetings are replaced with online activities. What Spanish Courses to Take

The following information will help you select the Spanish course you need to take according to your proficiency level.

Spanish as a Foreign Language Track

A student can take Spanish as a Foreign Language if he/she is a native speaker of English or another foreign language. If a student has never taken Spanish, he/she must be enrolled in SPAN 001-Elementary Spanish I (5 units). If a student has taken 1, 2, or more years of Spanish in high school or another institution, he/she may take the Spanish placement exam to determine his/her proficiency level. He/she may be placed in SPAN 002- Elementary Spanish II (5 units), SPAN 003- Intermediate Spanish I (4 units), or SPAN 004 – Intermediate Spanish II (4 units).

Spanish for Heritage Speakers Track

A student can be considered as a heritage speaker of Spanish if Spanish and English are spoken at home and/or Spanish is spoken very often. If a student can ask and answer questions orally in Spanish but he/she does not know how to read and write in Spanish, he/she must be enrolled in SPAN 021-Spanish for Heritage Speakers I (5 units). If a student can ask and answer questions orally in Spanish and have basic knowledge of how to read and write in Spanish, he/she must be enrolled in SPAN 022-Spanish for Heritage Speakers II (5 units).

Spanish Placement Test

To ensure the correct placement in a Spanish course, the Spanish Placement Exam will be given in Palm Desert at 5:00 p.m.-6:00 p.m. on Nov. 13, 20, 27, Dec. 4, Jan 23 and 30 in the Communication Building, room 113. The exam will be given in Indio at 3:00 p.m.-4:00 p.m. on Oct. 31, Nov. 9, 16, and 30, room 102. Pre-registration is not required. Be prepared to take the exam that will begin promptly on any of the dates listed above.

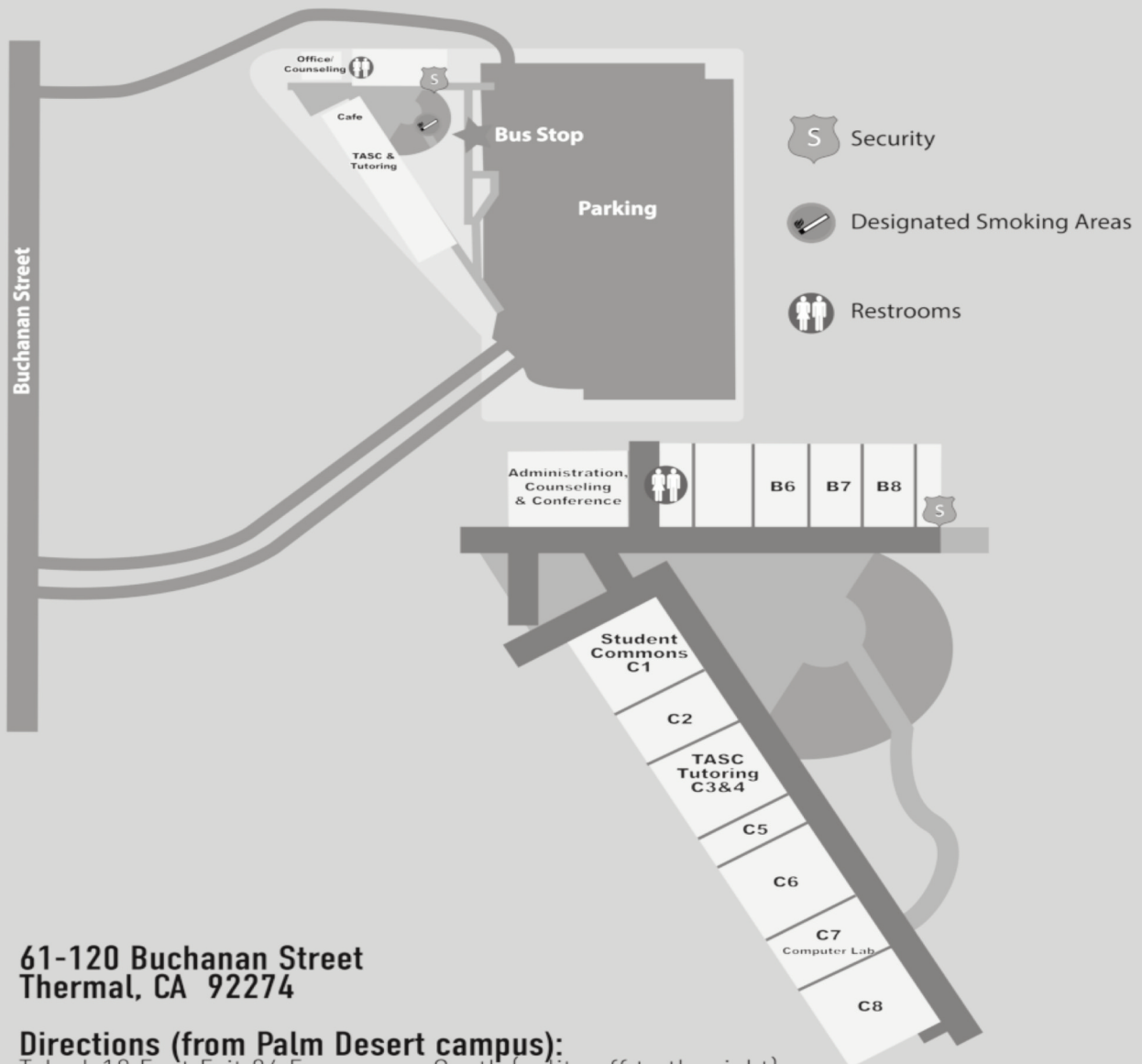

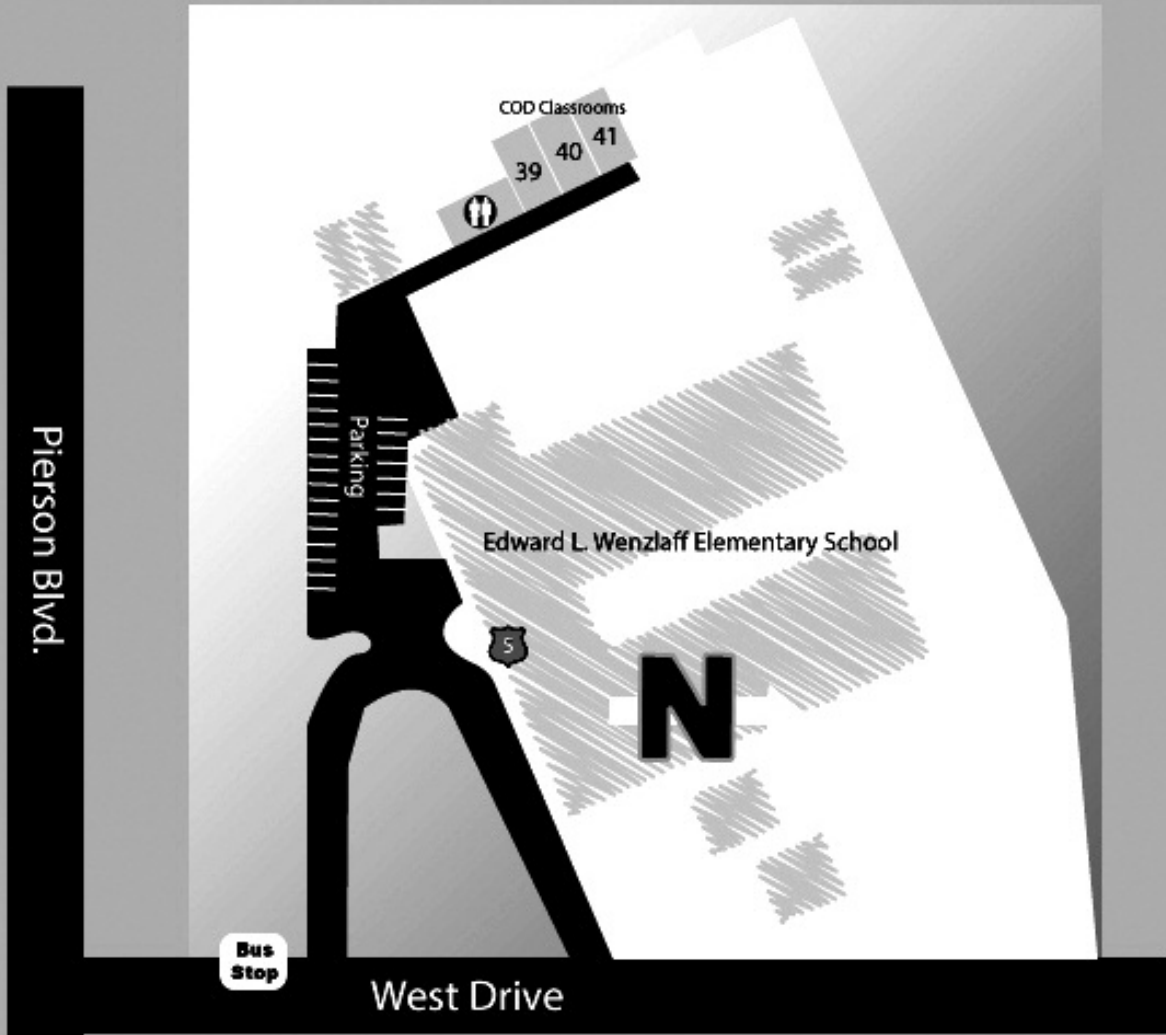

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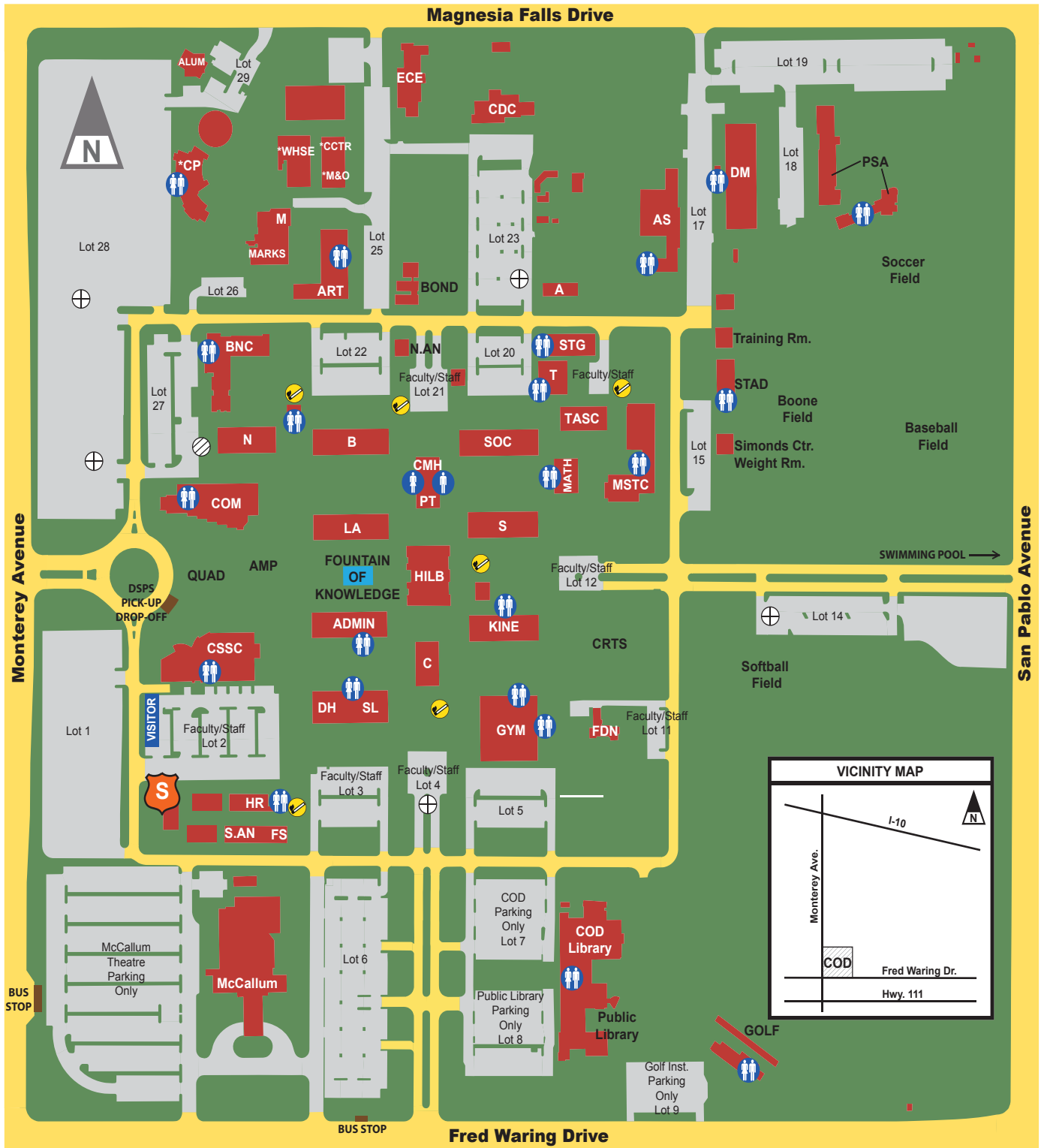
