



EAST LAKE FIRE RESCUE ASSISTANT CHIEF GEORGE BESSLER RECEIVES COUNTY COMMENDATION

On the evening of Thursday, September, 12 while Chief Bessler was on his way home after working a late night, he passed a medical emergency where he could see CPR being performed on an individual on a sidewalk adjacent to the road. Chief Bessler pulled his department vehicle onto the shoulder, put his lights on, grabbed his medical bag and Automatic External Defibrillator (AED), and rushed to the scene. He was the first EMS unit on scene and confirmed 911 had been contacted and instructed a civilian who had been performing chest compressions to continue. Chief Bessler



then attached the AED pads, analyzed the rhythm of the patient, determined it was shockable, cleared the patient, shocked one time and got back a heart rhythm with a faint pulse. Next to arrive on scene was a Sunstar supervisor. The patient still had a pulse but was not breathing so chief Bessler continued to provide rescue breaths. A Sunstar ambulance arrived next followed by a Seminole FD unit and care was transferred to them. Chief Bessler stayed on scene assisting with the incident until the patient was transported to the hospital. Chief Bessler received a Pinellas County Commendation from Dr. Jameson.

Chief Bessler highly recommends that everyone obtains CPR/AED training. You never know when you will be in the right place at the right time with the opportunity to save a life. East Lake Fire Rescue offers CPR classes monthly. To register for a class, click: https://www.elfr.org/cpr-classes

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR ELWCA MANAGER by Debi Hudrlik, AMS, CMCA

Recently the East Lake Woodlands shopping center repaved their parking lot between the Walmart and the Metro/ McDonalds gates. In conjunction with the project, East Lake Woodlands Community Association (ELWCA) installed new pedestrian exit signs on

ELWCA property identifying where pedestrians may access the shopping center along with the Sun Trust Bank property. We respectfully ask that pedestrians utilize these three designated exits and not walk through the center islands and in between any entrance or exit gate. This is very unsafe and someone may get hurt. Additionally, the Metro/McDonalds pedestrian exit can now accommodate wheelchair access to the plaza. Recognizing the shopping center stopped their repaving project at the property lines in front of the gates, ELWCA will be repaving the remaining section of the Walmart and Metro/McDonalds gate area in 2020 along with other planned paving projects.

The next gate to receive an upgrade will be the SunTrust gate with work anticipated first/second quarter 2020. At that time, the community association plans to convert the roll gates to barrier arm gates similar but faster than those recently installed at the Metro/McDonalds gate. The intent of this project is provide residents with quicker egress while alleviating the potential for non-resident "piggybacking" into the community.

Our pond maintenance vendor, Aquatic Systems, Inc., merged with another company called SOLitude earlier this year. Very shortly they will be converting their trucks and employee uniforms. Please be advised that we have not changed vendors, and the same individuals servicing our account will remain. The SOLitude Team has been very responsive to any maintenance requests. Future inquiries regarding the ponds should be sent to board@eastlakewoodlands.com or to my attention directly at dhudrlik@mgmt-assoc.com.

We are contracting with Pinellas County to replace a lot of signage in various locations within the community, such as golf cart crossing signs, speed limit signs, adding pedestrian walkway lines and signs, etc. Work will begin after the holidays.

On November 4 the Drainage Committee met with their Consultant and Contractor to perform a maintenance inspection. We are awaiting the proposal from the contractor for these repairs, and we anticipate that work will begin in February/ March, prior to the rainy season. We would like to thank those of you who advise us when you note a problem, such as a storm drain that may not be draining as quickly as it should. We encourage all homeowners to be proactive, as we do not mind at all when you reach out to us with a concern.

Last month the SunTrust entrance and the entire north entrance off of East Lake Road was pressure washed and river rock was installed along the entrance wall. All lighting at the North and South entrance was thoroughly checked, bulbs replaced and holiday lighting installed, as well as additional Christmas decorations such as wreaths, bows, menorahs, ribbons, etc. We hope that everyone enjoyed the display, and we have included funds in the 2020 budget for decorating as well.

We continue to receive calls regarding street light outages through the community. Please rest assured that we are diligently reporting these to both TECO and Duke Energy, and they have been out to make repairs. One of the reasons it is taking so long is that many of the poles do not contain identification numbers, which is the best way to report an accurate location. We have asked both TECO and Duke to appropriately number each pole so that future repairs can be made in a timely manner. The security officers make note of lighting outages every night on their shift rotation, and a report is generated twice each month requesting repairs.

Please be advised that the offices of Management & Associates will be closed for the holidays beginning Friday, December 20 at 4:00 PM through Wednesday, January 1. In the event of an emergency, please call the main line at 813-433-2000 and the answering service will assist you.



ANIMAL OF THE MONTH RED-BREASTED MERGANSER

Red-breasted Mergansers are among the fastest flying ducks, clocking speeds of up to 81 miles per hour. To get airborne though, they need a running start. Their legs are positioned near their rear making it difficult

to walk on land, but are an asset when diving. They do not defend territories and are social birds year-round. Breeding habitat is in the tundra and boreal-forest zones. Breeding occurs on fresh, brackish, and saltwater wetlands and in sheltered bays. During migration, and in winter, Red-breasted Mergansers occur mostly on salt water, in coastal bays, estuaries, and other protected coastal areas.

Red-breasted Mergansers primarily eat small fish, but also crustaceans, insects, and tadpoles on occasion. In the summer, they forage in shallow waters with submerged vegetation and plentiful fish. In the winter they forage in shallow marine waters. They dive underwater or swim with their eyes just below the surface as if they were snorkeling to look for prey. They also will herd minnows into restricted areas, allowing easy capture. The serrations on the bill help them keep hold of slippery fish.

Females first breed at the age of two years. Courting males salute a female with head held high and then curtsy to the female by tipping up and putting their rear in the air with their bill held high. The female will then jab him with her bill. Courting males also shake their head side to side to get the attention of a female. Once the female accepts the male, she stretches her neck out while holding her bill down and then lowers her neck again in a bobbing motion. They will then form a monogamous bond for the breeding season, but the male will take off at the beginning of incubation (approximately one month later), leaving the female to take care of the young alone. Males head to secluded waters to molt their

feathers before migrating south while females tend to molt near the breeding site.

The nest is located in a sheltered spot on the ground, usually near water. The female creates a simple depression that she covers with dead grasses, forming a shallow bowl. She also plucks down feathers from her breast to help insulate the nest. The female lays 7 to 10 eggs, and will sometimes lay eggs in the nests of other females. Within a day or so of hatching, the young will then follow the female to water where they can feed themselves. Within a few weeks, the females typically abandon the young, who cannot fly until they are about two months old. The young ducklings eat mostly insects.

PUMPKIN LOAF

- Nonstick cooking spray
- 4 eggs

• 2 sticks butter 2 cups sugar

puree

• 1 can (15 ounces) pumpkin

• 1 cup chocolate chips

• 1 cup walnuts, chopped

- 3 1/2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon salt
- Heat oven to 350 F.
- Prepare loaf and muffin pans with nonstick cooking spray.
- In bowl, whisk eggs. Set aside.
- In separate bowl, sift flour, baking soda, cinnamon, nutmeg and salt together. Set aside.
- In another bowl, cream butter and sugar. Add whisked eggs and mix until blended.
- Alternately add flour mixture and pumpkin puree to egg mixture, beating until blended. Fold in chocolate chips and walnuts.
- Pour batter into loaf and muffin pans. Bake 40-45 minutes, or until toothpick inserted into center comes out clean.
- Cool 10 minutes before removing from pans.



REMINISCING WITH "IRA CALL" & "MEMORY LAYNE"

Editor's Note: Editor's Note: This month I thought it might be fun to take a break from writing a column myself and decided to ask two local historians "Ira Call" & "Memory Layne" to co-write an article about the history of East

Lake Woodlands. Sadly, neither showed up when we were scheduled to meet and we had to re-schedule.

At our next meeting, I quickly realized neither "Ira Call" or "Memory Layne" could help in anyway. Neither was focused on why we were there, neither was prepared or brought a pen or paper, nothing was written down and I ultimately "got soaked" for their martini lunches. In the end I decided to forget the idea of asking for their input but was fortunate to find the article below on the internet originally published in "The Patch" on October 29, 2011



EAST LAKE WOODLANDS & AL BOYD

Ever drive **by Boot Ranch Shoppes** and wonder where that name came from? Well, it wasn't just because of a big boot that adorns the center! The big boot which looked differently decades ago was actually built by a man name Al Boyd as a monument representing the name of his ranch and its entryway. The entryway to Boot Ranch was about at the Tampa and East Lake Roads intersection. The boot was repainted.

Al Boyd was born in Florida in 1913. Safety Harbor to be exact. He was raised in his family's homestead on Curlew Road and was the oldest son. Al's father (Jesse Boyd) was a butcher who delivered meats to surrounding areas and acquired about 100 acres that he used for farmland. Keep in mind that there were different types of farming in the area at the time – vegetables, cattle, citrus. Al's father Jesse began to purchase land around north Pinellas and in Pasco County, eventually amassing at the peak of ownership, 10,000 acres while Al owned 6,000 acres. It was around the late 1920s when the county government mandated a fencing ordinance that the ranchers in south Pinellas could no longer allow their cattle herds to roam unless they moved their herds to north Pinellas. This created a bit of a bind for southern ranchers but not for Al's father. Mr. Boyd was able to continue to purchase land while leasing his lands to southern ranchers.

In the 1930's and 1940's, the Boyds purchased large blocks of acreage. The Boyds owned an area of where State



Road 584's boundary is (more people know it as Tampa Road) through to Pasco County where the Anclote River bordered on the North and West, down into Lake Tarpon and a northwest piece of Hillsborough County. Al had many heads of cattle grazing on the acreage.

Al started to sell off some of the land after his father died in 1950. He kept about 1,200 acres that he used for cattle breeding. Boot Ranch became known for prize winning cattle. Al had what the locals called a **Party House** on the ranch where people would visit – famous people such as **Lana Turner** and the **president of Nicaragua**. As the story goes, the Party House was also used by County **Commissioners** for meetings with Al. Mr. Boyd was very generous to the county through acts such as granting right of ways on his property to deeding property for **East Lake Road**. A County Administrator once dubbed Al "The Father of the East Lake Tarpon".

Al sold off the last of his 1,200 acres in 1972 where about 800 acres of that became East Lake Woodlands. He kept just nine acres. He sold those 1,200 acres for about \$2,000,000 to Metro Communities Corp. on just a handshake. Now, just one home could sell for that and more in East Lake! How times have changed!

Al led an interesting life. He gave name to Boot Ranch, had great interest in ecology, bred **Brahman cattle** with local cattle, won prizes for his stock, and entertained many famous **movie stars**, foreign **merchants** and **heads of state** at his ranch. Next time you pass that boot, remember that it is a man's legacy.

Did you know that rumor has it that there was a room with a window built into the big boot because Al wanted to shoot back at the people who thought taking shots at the boot was fun? It's rumored that the toe of the big boot at Boot Ranch has remnants of that window!
