UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS College of Education

The College of Education offers eight undergraduate teacher licensure and non-licensure degree programs that prepare students for careers in the field of education, human resources, business, technology, government, and more.

The following information is relevant to ALL College of Education programs. Please see specific programs for further details.

1. Transferable Hours

Transferable hours are defined as the hours and grades added to a student's academic record, which may or may not satisfy degree requirements, but can be used to satisfy transferable hour requirements for transfer admission. However, transfer evaluation designations such as NOTR (non-transferable) and UNKN (no previous articulation and will need to be determined) are also displayed on the transfer evaluation form. Those grades are not factored in a student's transfer GPA.

3. Language other than English Requirement

For admission to the College of Education, all transfer applicants must have completed either two years of one language other than English in high school or through the second level (2 semesters) of one language other than English in college prior to the desired term of entry. For graduation from the College of Education, a student must complete three years of one language other than English in high school or through the third level (3 semesters) of one language other than English in college the third level (3 semesters) of one language other than English in college. <u>It is strongly encouraged that transfer applicants complete the College of Education's Language Requirement for graduation prior to transfer.</u>

4. Coursework

Specific courses are required for admission to individual programs. Refer to desired program for a list of required courses. Consult <u>https://transferology.com/</u> for course equivalencies.

5. GPA 2.75 minimum; 3.0 GPA or higher is highly recommended (A=4.0). Please note that the CS + Education program requires a minimum GPA of 3.5.

6. Eligibility for James Scholar Honors Program

Transfer students who enter the College of Education in the fall with a minimum of a 3.50 GPA will be invited to participate in the <u>James Scholar Honors Program</u>.

The following information is an overview of the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) requirements. These requirements only apply to programs preparing students for teacher education licensure in the state of Illinois.

All students entering licensure programs are working towards: (1) Completing degree requirements approved and administered by the University of Illinois; and (2) Completing licensure requirements governed by ISBE. Note: ISBE requirements are subject to change without notice at any time.

1. MATH Standard (Elementary Education ONLY)

To show proficiency in College Algebra and Statistics, all **Elementary Education** students must meet the criteria listed here: <u>http://education.illinois.edu/docs/default-source/saao-documents/isbe_math_stnds.pdf</u>. It is highly recommended that all students applying to the Elementary Education program have the College Algebra criteria (column 1) met at the time of application.

2. Grades lower than a C-

Students in teaching licensure programs must maintain a C- or better in ALL content/professional education coursework as well as any courses specified by degree program. Please contact our office for a list of courses applicable to this policy. **Courses with a grade of Credit/CR can be counted towards the 120-125 hours required to graduate but will not be allowed to meet degree requirements (e.g., General Education, Professional Education coursework, major requirements, etc.).**

3. Criminal Background Check

4. Student teaching is completed only during the spring semester

5. Fewer than 30 College Credits

Students who have completed fewer than 30 semester hours of credit in college prior to application are evaluated primarily on the following criteria: grades in college, courses in college, high school academics, ACT or SAT scores and essays, with transfer admission preference given to students who would have been admitted as freshmen.

Computer Science + Education

The Computer Science + Education (CS+ Education) degree program is a joint program sponsored by the Department of Computer Science and the Department of Curriculum & Instruction. Students pursuing this major must select one of two concentrations:

- <u>Learning Sciences</u>: The Learning Sciences concentration focuses on how technology can be designed and developed to further education through the use of social media, virtual and augmented realities, data analytics, mobile and wearable devices, and more.
- <u>Secondary Education</u>: The Secondary Education concentration is designed for students to become licensed to teach computer science at the middle school and high school levels (grades 5-12). This degree will provide students with the knowledge and field experience necessary to teach and develop computer science curricula.

A cumulative grade point average of 3.50 or higher (A=4.00) is required for admission to Computer Science + Education. However, a minimum grade of A- is required for each Computer Science course taken.

NOTE: <u>Candidates in this program will require a minimum of three years at the University of Illinois to</u> <u>complete the CS+ Education degree requirements, regardless of transfer hours earned.</u>

Early Childhood Professional Education

In compliance with the *Illinois Early Childhood Access Consortium for Equity Act*, the College of Education will offer admission to students who have satisfied the following admission requirements:

- Are or were a member of the incumbent workforce currently working or having worked in the early childhood field.
- AA, AS, AAS or AT degree with major in Early Childhood Education from an approved Illinois community college. The degree must be completed prior to the first term of enrollment at UIUC.
- Gateways Level 4 Credential and current membership in the Gateways to Opportunity Registry
- Minimum GPA of **2.0**

The Early Childhood Professional Education Program is uniquely designed to offer coursework online, in the evening, and in an eight-week format to meet the needs of working professionals. Field and clinical experiences will be arranged to meet the geographic and logistical constraints of program participants. This program offers two professional tracks:

- **Licensure Track** ECE bachelor's degree and Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) Professional Educator Licensure 0-2nd Grade and Gateways Level 5 Credential.
- **Non-Licensure Track** ECE bachelor's degree and Gateways Level 5 Credential.

This degree program prepares teacher candidates to work with individuals with varying disabilities and will lead to Illinois licensure to teach students with disabilities from kindergarten through age 21 in a range of settings. **Please note that transfer into the Special Education program is highly competitive due to space constraints.**

Application to the Special Education program is available for **fall admission only.**

The SPED program has a 5-semester professional education sequence beginning in the spring semester. In the preceding fall semester, program specific courses SPED 117, KIN 262 & SHS 320 are completed, leaving room for 2-3 additional gen ed courses (other than those courses required for admission). To proceed to the professional education sequence, students must have successfully completed **ALL** degree requirements outside of the professional education coursework.

Hours Verification Form

As part of the admission process to the Special Education program, verification of a **minimum of 50 hours** of experience with students with disabilities is required and to be documented on the <u>Special</u> <u>Education Hours Verification form</u>. Please read the form carefully and completely before submitting to the <u>Admissions/Records Officer</u>.
